*Part of this Lady's Head-Dress is a Black Velvet Bonnet embel-
lished with a Band of Pearls and precious Stones, under which is a Cap
of Gold Gauze. The short loose Jacket with half Sleeves puffed at the Shoul-
ders, is of Black Velvet. The Gown is of Silk, and sometimes the Bottom
and Fore Part are embroider'd.*

This Lady's Head Dress, consists of a large Ring of Silver, over which is thrown a Veil of Gold Tulle, that falls down over her Shoulders. Pieces are cut off from the Veil & given to y^e Bridemen & Bridemaids when it is taken off on y^e Wedding Night.
