# TO THOSE WHO GRIPE ABOUT A U.S. WINTER: IN ALPS THERE IS REAL TRAGEDY 

Fresh snow had fallen over the Apine villages but their traditional Chrisimas-eard look was now strangely disturbed. Steep-pabled harns stome anry, and helicopters had intruted on the old-fazhioned scene. Aratanchee hat come and rescuers were out on their denperate tashs.
Early winter on Europe's Apine heights had been warm and deceptively mild. The snow did not conke until late in December and every. where the winter resorts were complaining. In January the snow grew heavier, Jalling in fat, wet flakes, more than three soggy feet of it in
onc 2 -hour period. As it piled up thamp and heavy on the mountain slopes, Switzerland's famous Avalanche lustitute at Daros hegan flashing its warnings. But when layt woek the pached masses of snow came sliding thunderously down iato the vallers, most mountain folk were sitting eomfortably by their liresides. In the tustrian village of Blons more than 65 people were kilted when two avalanches, one striking immediately after the other, wiped out 20 houses. In another village, Schruns, 14 people died when a snowslide swept away seren

## homes on the slopes of Itonshopf mountain.

 In Austria at least 119 dead were counted.From all over the central regions of the high mountains, From switzerland where the death total went above 25 . from Italy where slides in the Bremner Pass took two lives, Irom Germany's Ravarian Alps where six died, came tragic stories, Nen died quickly under Rutshhlaminen, tons of hard snow that swept everything belore it, or dical slowly under Staublawiuen. smothering masses of fine powdered suow that pached eyes, mouths, nostrils of its victims.

## CHILDREN AND DOGS AID RESCUE

The winter had barely begun but already it was among the worst avalanehe years the Austrian Alps had ever known, even worse than last year when the snowslides took more than 100 lives. In Blons the first avalanche tossed 20 houses into the river Lutz. Rescuers dug up 25 people, took them to one of the remaining houses for treatment. Then a second avalanche buried both the rescuers and the rescued.

At first the battered towns, unreachable by air because of the weather and isolated by snowslides on the ground, had to fend for themselves. Villagers dug until they were arm-weary. But American Army and Swiss helieopters whirled up to bring in relief supplies and take out survivors. From Switzerland eame an army of rescuers, making the cross-country trek by ski to help dig out Blons and other villages.

For the future the occupying powers granted Austria permission to set up paraehute teams of doctors and rescue workers who could he dropped into hard-hit areas. For now the main hope was that cold weather would freeze the snow to the ground and end the danger. The cold did not come, but as the days wore on the roaring slowly receded, as from exhaustion.

## LUCK NAMED THOSE WHO LIVED

"The avalanche took the young and left the old," said one bitter survivor. But actually chance, degree of a slope, the direction of a rescuer's probing steel hook as it was pushed into a snowbank determined whether people lived or died. In the villages, people mourned the children who had been smothered, pious kin who had been swept into ravines on their way to church. Survivors stared hopelessly around and slowly began to pick up the pieces of their lives.
Strange stories came in from everywhere. Two men and a woman, age 70, swept downstream from battered Blons, were miraculously found alive 50 hours later. An old woman survived because a hoard fell across her face, giving her room to breathe. At Dalaas men had to hunt all day for a 120 -ton locomotive which had been swept off the track in the railroad yards. A farmer crossing his fields watched his house-in which were his mother, wife, three children-crushed. At Schruns a shoemaker (opposite page) strolled out of the room in which his family was sitting and, a few moments later, picked himself up out of the snow and wreckage at the bottom of the hill to find himself now a man without a family.

According to one cynical theory of U.S. political practiceto which a considerable number of politicians unfortunately still adhere-the whole science of getting elected to office can be summarized in the most primitive kind of questions and answers:
Q. Mr. Politician. what do you favor?
A. Motherhood.
Q. What are you opposed to?
A. Sin.
Q. What kind of boy were you?
A. Barefoot.
Q. Where did you learn to love America?
A. At my mother's knce, the little red schoolhouse and the little white chureh.
Q. Why are you running for office?
A. Because of the inspiration of my ever patient wife.
Q. What will you strive for if elected?
A. To serve my beloved country to the best of my humble ability.
Q. And when will you disclose your specific program?
A. In due time.

Folklorc has it that the politician is a cliché-spouting hack who stands foursquare on the principles of democracy and his admiration for the gr-r-rand and glor-r-r-r-rious Fourth of July. He yields to no man in his love for the great American heritage, the memory of the brave men at Valley Forge, the Monroe Doetrine, the Stars and Stripes, babies, dogs and horses. He deplores murder, arson. cancer, drought, the Japanese beetle and hoof and mouth disease.

## How to befuddle a heckler

There is a story about the late Senator Bilho, the great Southern demagog. One day a heckler tried to pin him down on a burning local issue, namely a proposed law to protect squirrels during the mating season. The senator said, "Tll fell you how I feel ahout it. Half my friends are for it and half my friends are against it-and I'm for my friends." This story may he apoeryphal, but its implieations are sound. Many politicians try in one way or another to stay in all possihle camps. The politieian of the cynical folklore decries inflation while favoring an easy-money policy; he wants good roads, free colleges, free seeds and low taxes; he wants a U.S. Army second to none and deplores the draft; he wants high wages, rich farmers and low prices. He favors states' rights and a strong federal government.

He is an expert at what the popular historian. Frederiek Lewis Allen, onee deseribed as Franklin Roosevelt's tactics in the 1932 election-talking ahout candor while never exercising it. And all this mostly because he has a respect hordering on ohsequiousness toward some of the groups of American society. There is a strong and persistent belief among politicians that you cannot possibly be elected to any important U.S. office if you antagonize either 1) the farmers or 2) the veterans. Also in some areas 3) the unions and 4) the old folks. If cornered you simply bow down and give the pressure groups-or rather the men who make careers out of leading pressure groups-anything they demand. whatever the effect on the UT.S. as a whole.

This may once have been a good theory of pragmatic politics, although no historian could prove it. The Republican party, it so happens, received its initial great impetus from Abraham Lincoln, who showed no hesitancy in making more enemies and therefore winning a sounder place in his country's heart than any other American politician before him. The party began to fall on evil days when its leaders pussyfooted on questions like Prohibition. It was the opposition's Al Smith, who didn't mind standing up, speaking his mind,
infuriating the W.C.T.U. and delighting the thirsty majority, who set the stage for the Democrat era of the '30s and ' 40 s, even before the Great Depression came along.

Certainly the old mealy-mouth days, if they ever existed, are now dead and gone. Some nine million adult Americans have been to college, 36 million to high school, 63 million through grade sehool. They know the seore. They aren't going to vote for the best baby-kisser or the most generous dispenser of political pork. This is a new and sophisticated America, the best-educated country in the world. This is a nation in which good national policy and good politics are becoming synonymous-in which the ambitious politician need not fear to be a statesman first and foremost. Why else should Dwight Eisenhower, a man of no conventional political instincts, training or experience, have been elected President in such a national landslide?

Which brings us to the fine and statesmanlike new program which the President has submitted to the Congress-a program which could hardly be more dedieated to the best interests of the nation, the entire nation that is. The program was in incubation for more than a year. The President appointed the best men he could find in every area of government and told them to grapple with the problems until they came up with the best possible solutions. The farm program, for example, represents the work of 60 separate studies and consultation with 500 farm experts. Similar work went into the proposals for forcign relations, national defense, internal security, economic policy, the budget, taxes, lahor, social sccurity, health, housing and all the rest.
But just lecause the program is so statesmanlike, a number of politicians reared on the old folklore are frightened to death. Election year is a time, in the minds of the cliché artists, to let sleeping dogs lie. It develops that Congress is even afraid to vote itself a well-deserved and hadly needed pay raise just before an election. As for weightier matters, many of the menbers would just rather not talk about the TaftHartley law right now, thank you, mueh less make any realistic changes. On the matter of sliding parity-the only sensible attack made on the farm problem in years-a lot of legislators have simply thrown up their hands.
Senator Young of North Dakota, for example, said last week that if somebody should get up in Congress and propose to keep high-priee supports instead of a lower parity percentage for farmers. "who is going to vote against it?", In other words Senator Young and other folklore-ridden politicians of his type would let the government just keep on giving the farmers everything their most fanatic and shortsighted spokesmen might ask-meanwhile letting the surpluses of butter and eggs pile up in the warehouses to the eventual ruin of the farmers.

## News for the senator

We have news for you, Senator Young. There are a lot more consumers than farmers in America, and they know all about the farm mess that your kind of thinking has created. Moreover the modern farmer himself is quite capable of seeing beyond the end of his nose. Fven though the legislative program was not coneeived as politics, even though the President made a little apology to the effect that he was perhaps "not too smart politically," we predict that in this enlightened day and age it will turn out to be the most effective kind of politics. You, Senator Young, and the other oldfashioned politicians who worry so pathetically that the farmers won't stand for progress, or the C.I.O. won't, or the Union Club, this group and that group-you're going to wake up some day to discover that nobody's in favor of statesmanship except the whole darn country.


## THE SKIS THAT LAUNCHED A BILLION BUFFS

Last week a slight misadventure by an amateur Berlin ski jumper, and a lucky shot by a German photogrampher. produced one of the most widely published news pictures in years. The picture, in hundreds of newspapars and TV newscasts, drew a billion belly laughs. It showed a fellow named linz Mannstedt unconsciousIn imitating the wistful heroics of Keaton, Lloyd and Chaplin as he sailed through the air without his skis.
Vanmstedt had entered the contest with a friend's skis. Though the toe straps were missing he felt that he could jump anyway. But as he soared gracefully from the jump the skis dropped off. Oblivious of his
predicament, Mannstedt leaned forward, windmilled on through the air. Then, about to laval, he hooked down, sparely had time to register astonishment as he plummeted into the soft snow. Humiliated but unharmed, Manustell stood up, got another chance from the judges and went on to win third place in his class.

A number of U.S. editors were so astonished by the incongruous photograph that they suspected a fake and challenged the Associated I'ress on its authenticity. ONCE MORE CHICAGO HAS A QUEEN

Mrs. Palmer's elected heir is farm implement on hoth sides
Chicago has been without a proper society chieftainess since the elegant 1890 days of Mrs. Potter Palmer, who wore her queenship in a diamondstudded belt and a dog collar set with 2,268 pearls and seven large diamonds. To fill the vacant throne the Chicago Daily News decided to hold a somewhat democratic election and sent out ballots to 2,000 city socialites. Chicago's new society queen, said the News in deploring Mrs. Palmer's lack of "the common touch," should be "a person of graciousness and charm who has the ability to carry on and be a leader without being haughty."

Early returns brought mocking hallots for the wife of Chicago's bachelor mayor, for Mrs. Ben Edict Arnold (a form of prairie wit), identified as a "prominent society and cultural leader in Lake Forest," and for Mammy Yokum, Dogpatch queen, who got off to a flashy start with nine votes. In the stretch, the mavericks faded and the crown went to Mrs. Chauncey McCormick, wife of a director of International Harvester Co. and rated especially high in Chicago's own aristocracy because, one admirer explained, she is "farm implement on both sides" (below). Mrs. McCormick is one of U.S.'s richest women occasionally gives dinners on gold plate, works for numerous charitics. Publicly the new queen declared herself "completely overcome," but a friend said, "Marion is mad as a snake-she so hates publicity."

## Harvard men confess Red ties, a pilot named Godfrey gets into a jam, Egypt cracks down on fanatics

Professor Wendell H. Furry and Leom J. Kamin, research physicist, of Harvard surprised Senator MeCarthy hy waiving their constitutional right not to testify against themselves. They admitted they had formerly heen Communists hut refused to identify other Reds, defying MoCarthy's threats to jail them for contempt. Said Kamin, "T do not think that my duty requires me to he a political informer." Furry admitted that five other Reds worked with him on a secret wartime radar joh. Said Mefartin, "To me it is inconceivable that a great unisersit! would heep this type of crea-

ture on to teach our children." But, he added, Harvarl I'resident Pusey "has already made clear he will go on maintaining a sanctuary for Fifth Amendment Communists,"

Next day Meciarthy questioned employes at G.E.'s lymn, Mass. plant. He got no new conlessions. But his audience heeame so ohstreperous that McCarthy had guards forcibly eject one witness, one lawyer and a spectator, suspented employe Nat Mills (above), whe screamed, "Medarthy, I accuse you of conspiring with the company and getting the jobs of G.E. people."

Missing witness Donald Ritehic, who the week before had skipped out after collecting a $\$ \mathbf{5}, 000$ reward for telling Detroit police who shot Walter Reuther in t918, wan taken into custody again by Canadian cops. But he refused to waive extradition to Michigan.

## No bu ttering up for Russia

A Minnesota businessman asked permission to buy 40 million pounds of government surplus butter so he could sell it to Russia. Although food is not considered a "eritical material," he was turned down. The sale might have upset the world butter market. And the U.S.S.R. would have gotten the butter for 50 c a pound, about 17 e less than the government paid U.S. farmers for it.

In one of the biggest deals automobile companies have ever made, Indson and Nash-Kelvinator voted to merge. The new corporation, called American Motors, will be the fourth largest anto company in the wortd, after GM, Ford and Chrysler.

## Actress flusters Tito's cabinet

An actress caused the first serious argument in Tito's cabinet since Yugoslavia broke with Moseow. The lady in question, Milena Vrajakova, married the army's chief of staff last year. When she found herself unpopular with wives of other high officials, Milovan Djilas, president of parliament, came to her aid. He charged in
 magazine artieles that the other wives, most of whom were former partisan guerrillas, looked down on Milena because she had never fought. But Milena was only 13 years old at the time of the hattles, said Djilas. Then he gave lurid descriptions of past scandals the other ladies had been involved in. Djilas quichly found himself subject to ideological attack, accused of advocating that Communist discipline be weakened. So Tito cut short a vacation in the mountains and returned to Belgrade to quiet things down.

When Pfc. Charles Goodman, en route in a U.S. military train from W'est Germany to Berliu, ploppet his burracks bag dourn in the corridor, someone chanced to kick it. At this, the bag squirmed and squented. Inside, with Goodman's genr and dirty clothes, was a pretty, 5 -foot, 90 -pound German girl. "He are enguged," explained Goodman.

## Wha Luzzed? The wind or Arthur?

Arthur Godfrey was disgruntled. He wasn't allowed to take off in his 25,200 -pound DC-3 from a Teterboro, N.J. airport runway rescrvel for planes weighing less than 9,000 . He took off from the correct runway, hut what

happened next made the control tower men dive for safety. Godfrey's plane had swung round, headed for them. It zoomed by with 20 feet to spare and Godfrey called over the radio, "That's a normal take-off at Teterboro."

Back on TV, Godfrey read his fans the headline: "Godfrey Cited As Wild Flier." He adlibhed gaily, "Roop-di-doo-dee rocky woe. It seems I'm a bad, bad boy." The wind, he explained, had pushed his plane off course.

Airport authorities were not laughing. "It was a deliberate buzz job," said one official. Another declared the wind could not possibly have put the hig DC.3 so far off course, said Godfrey was reckless, and requested a thorough Civil Aeronautics inquiry into why Godfrey's plane had endangered several lives.

## Moslem Brotherhood is banned

Egypt's military regime rounded up 450 leaders of the Moslem Brotherhood, charging they had plotted to overthrow the government. The junta thus smashed a half-million member organization led by religious fanatics dedieated to restoring the antiquated laws of Mohammed. All other political organizations had been outlawed after the 1952 coup, but the Brotherhood was allowed to survive because it was so deeply rooted throughout the Moslem population and because its members had helped in the revolution. With the Brotherhood extremints out of the way, the West should find it easier to make friends with Egypt. But whether the Brotherhood would stay smashed was a question. Farouk's government outlawed it in 1948 and was upset four years later.

## ASTORIA GETS THE CREEPS AGAIN

## Houses and inhabitants are upset as an old geological quirk keeps an Oregon city sliding downhill

This month residents of Astoria, Ore, had the queasy sensation again that their city was slipping right out from under them. In a twobloch area (above) along First and West Commercial streets, the land was visibly sliding downhill. It moved as much as two feet an hour, tifting and topphing the houses, buchling the asphaft roads like old tinoleum.

Actually, Astoria has had the ereeps for a long time. Situated on a ridge overlooking the
mouth of the Columhia River, its buildings rest on a layer of spongy topsoil. After a torrential rain, the soaker ground slips down the impervious shale bedroch underneath. sometimes taking the buildings with it. "We are always having to jack up our houses," says City Manager Brewer Billic. But after a big sfide in 1950 jacks were not enough. Twantyone houses had to he moved or ahandoned.

The slide this month began more sudilenly
than ever hefore. "We woke up in the middie of the night," said Cab Driver Harvey LaChance. "The creahing and groaning scared my wife half to death." By morning his house was shifting off its foundation and the furnace was eoming up through the living room floor. When the sliding stopped, LaChance and 12 ! others had fled, and City Vanager Billie was offering free city lots elsewhere to homeless Astorians whose property had slippod away.

# DID THE JET AGE COME TOO SOON? 

# No, even though the British are going through a painful time ironing out the famed Comet's bugs

NOT since the great ship Titanic went down had the British people felt such a stunning blow to their pride as masters of transport. The Titanic was to have been queen of the ocean sca. But Britain's swift and majestic airliner, the Comet, was to be overlord of the limitless ocean air. Last week the Comet was grounded.

From the outset the Comet made the world catch its breath in admiration. On that momentous May 2, 1952 when, after five years of building and testing, the slim, silver-winged Comet carried its first paying passengers from London to Johannesburg in $23^{1 / 2}$ hours, headlines shouted the news around the world. The first jet-engined transport, long dreamed of, was a reality. Thousands of photos blazoned the B.O.A.C. (British Overseas Airways Corp.) speedbird erest beside the No. 1 Comet's cryptic factory serial designation: G-ALYP.

All went well for many wecks thercafter. Passengers flocked to hurtle from London to Rome in little more than two hours (one newsman, tired of London spaghetti, flew to Rome for lunch and returncd the same afternoon). From the Comet's lordly eight-mile altitude, above all clouds and weather, Europe itself looked little bigger than a map. The sky above seemed dark hecause the air was so free of dust that the sun's light had little to reflect against. Never before had travelers come so close to the silent, effortless flight of birds. Within the plane on the ground the demoniac whine of the four kerosenegulping de Havilland Ghost engines could scareely be beard (outside they sounded like all the banshees from hell). The Comet did not lumber, strain and groan on take-off like propeller-driven planes; it rose as lightly as a feather on the hreeze. "Flying a Comet after flying a regular plane," said one pilot ectatatically, "is like driving a racing car after driving a truck." Aloft, there was none of the deafening roar or the nerve-wearing, floor-rattling vibration of piston engines. There was so little motion that a coin could be stood on end, a pencil balanced. And if a passenger made the mistake of reading a newspaper on London take-off, Paris would vanish before he unfastened his seat belt.
*. But five months after the first flight, on Oct. 26, 1952, a Comet taking off from Rome's Ciampino Airport did not quite get off. At
the moment of lift the tail was dragging along the ground like a surfboard, and the ship dropped back to join it. It was wrecked but nobody was killed. Government investigators put the whole thing down to "pilot error." Then, five months later, came the affair at Karachi. This time the pilot was one of the de Havilland company's most trusted pilots, long trained on Comets. Yet on the Karaehi take-off, he, too, dragged the Comet's tail and he, too, crashed, killing himself and 10 others. After that it was clear there was something more than "pilot error" involved.

Then came the first flight's anniversary-May 2, 1953. It was an ill-starred day. On that day a B.O.A.C. Comet leaving Calcutta fell six minutes after take-off, killing 43 aboard.

Meantime three of the latest Comets had gone to France's U.A.T. After a few months' scrvice one of these ships, landing at Dakar in French West Africa, was unable to stop at the end of the runway. It cracked up. Nobody was killed, but a fourth Comet was gone.

Last week came the most devastating blow. In midmorning the Comet, fresh from Beirut, had taken off from Ciampino in Rome. In half an hour, climbing at its usual rate of 1,000 feet a minute, it was ahout six miles high and approaching the fabled isles of Elba, where Napoleon was imprisoned, and of Monte Cristo, where the fietional count had been. Somewhere above the islands, and between them, the Comet apparently exploded. Another 35 victims hurtled into the Tyrrhenian Sea. As the waves swallowed up the splintering fuselage, they obliterated serial designation G-ALYP; it was the famous Comet of Flight No. 1.

Five Comets werc gone out of 21 so far made and one other was being dismantled for structural tests. The next day B.O.A.C. grounded the planes.

All over the world, people who had only recently gaped at the Comet's prodigies asked, "Is there something wrong with the plane? Are jet transports doomed? Did the jet age come too soon?" The answer to the first question is: Yes, there is something wrong with the Comet, as there has been with every new transport of whatever origin. The answer to the other two questions is: No, aceidents can no more

prevent the birth of faster means of transport than boiler explosions could kill the steam locomotive or the steamboat. Or, for that matter, than the Titanic disaster could interrupt man's building of larger and swifter ocean liners.

To understand what is wrong with the Comet one must first understand what the British tried to do with it. The steamship is a good analogy. In the first half of the 19 th Century, America's swift Yankee Clipper sailing vessels were the rulers of ocean commerce. But while Americans werc preoccupied with using steam to develop their vast hinterland, the British used it to regain the sea's supremacy. Even by the Titanic's time the U.S. had not caught up and has only begun to dosonow with the new United States and fast Mariner-type freighters.

In the air it was another matter. For one thing, the Wright brothers gave America first step to dominance. For another, America was the first to develop efficient transport planes. After World War I the only British transports were lumbering, converted bombers like the AvroLancastrian. The U.S. made an unsuccessful stab with the Ford trimotor, which carried a heavy load but lost money. Then, simultaneously with Germany's. development of the Junkers 52 , came the Boeing 247, which, like the Junkers, offered the first low-wing monoplane transport capable of carrying passengers at a profit.

Boeing then lost its lead to Douglas, whose DC-2 was similar but even more economical. Out of it grew the DC-3, which was queen of the prewar airlines, and, as the C-47 (British name: Dakota), became the workhorse of World War II. And out of that came the great fourmotored DC-4 or C.54, which, as of 1943, was miglitier than any transport man had imagined a decade before. It has long since been superseded by such faster and roomier giants as the DC-6 and DC-7, the Lockheed Constellation and Super-Constellation, and the Boeing double-decked Stratocruiser. But the DC-6 marked, as nothing else did, the superiority of U.S. transport planes to the British at World War II's end.

The reason was not merely that Britain had been slow to develop transports in the period between the two wars. It was also that in the 1939 emergency its main efforts had to be concentrated on the defense of Britain-i.e., on extremely fast but short-ranged interceptors like the Spitfire. The "Spit" saved Britain, but it could stay up little longer than it took to cross the channel and return. Moreover, once the Grand Alliance was joined, a joint decision was made for the U.S. to concentrate on multi-engined planes, the British on fighters and bombers.

That decision cut two ways. It gave the U.S. a tremendous edge on the whole postwar transport field, as witnessed by the necessity for B.O.A.C. to buy American-made Constellations and later Stratocruisers, (A Stratocruiser was used for the initial leg of the current world tour of the queen and her consort.) But it also gave the British at least a three-year edge in jets. And so, at war's end, when the British considered how best they might overtake America's lead in air transport, de Havilland chose the bold gamble of trying to overleap all of the U.S. supremacy in piston engines and bring to birth the first jet transport.

Let nobody say that de Havilland did not win the gamble. De Havilland's pioneering revolutionized air transport. In the first two years of its existence the Comet dazzled the eyes of such U.S. air Vikings as Pan American's Juan Trippe and Eastern's Eddie Ricken-

backer. Trippe has placed a firm order for three. Rickenbacker made a qualified offer for a Comet fleet, which, if it seemed mainly like bluff, nevertheless scared the three major U.S. transport makers-Douglas, Lockheed and Boeing-out of their penny-pinching reluctance and into the blueprinting of jets. All are still only blueprints save Boeing's, which is now being built at a cost of $\$ 20$ million.

## What is wrong with the Comets?

EVENTS have shown that aeronautical engineers still have a lot to learn about the performance of airfoils (wings) under jet conditions. In a piston-driven plane the pilot, on take-off, can pull the ship up as sharply as a $15^{\circ}$ angle without "stalling" (i.e., losing flying specd and falling). But a Comet will stall if its nose is lifted any sharper than a $3^{\circ}$ angle on take-off. This means that it has to be nursed in to the air with the slightest possible lift. Consequently it is much more likely to hit ground obstructions or conversely, if pulled up too quickly, to fall.

Moreover a conventional, piston-driven plane is helped into the air by what is known as the "ground cushion," a buoyancy created in part hy the propeller slipstream and by compression on the air beneath the wing surfaces. After the Karachi crash, de Havilland's engineers legan making stall tests on the ground and discovered that, perhaps hecause of the ahsence of propellers or the symmetry of the wing, or for some other reason, the Comet gets no "ground cushion" lift. On the contrary it gets a downward push which can make it stall. To overcome these shortcomings de Havilland is now building a big. ger, modifiel wing on the Comet II and III.

The Dakar crash points up another danger inherent in jets-the fact that, having no propeller, they cannot use the braking action of reversed props. De Havilland is working on that too, trying to create a reverse thrust which will help the speedy jets to slow down.

Critics find other flaws in the Comet. One is that the great altitudes required for its ellicient Ilight also require so much pressurization (eight pounds to the square inch at 40,000 feet $v$ s. four for the DC-6 at 18,000 fect) that if anything pierces its skin the whole plane may explode like a balloon. Even if the ship stayed together, the "explosive decompression" would be such that crew and passengers would be apt to die of the "bends" before the pilot could reach safe altitude. There are some indications that the passengers in the fifth crash died of such decompression.

Another economic drawback to the Comet is the fact that, despite its terrific cruising speed, its average speed on a flight is cut down considerably by the half hour or so it spends climbing to reach the 40,000 -foot level where it is most efficient, and in the hour or more it spends descending hefore landing.

There is less agreement on whether the Comet's housing of its engines inside the wing is dangerous. Some American designers, pointing out that each engine's compressor whirls at $15,000 \mathrm{rpms}$, warn that a single rotor blade, flying off, could chew the wing to pieces. There is also an obvious fire hazard. For this reason Boeing is designing its jet transport (p.54) with engine pods suspended below the wing as in the Boeing B-47 bomber. Boeing says some of these engines have caught fire and dropped off without burning the ship.

All of these matters aside, nothing has happened to jet transports which has not happened, in varying degree, to all the great transport ships on which the U.S, and the world depend. The DC-4 (or C-54)

occasionally blew up mysteriously in its early phases. The suspicion finally settled on gas fumes from midship tanks. The Constellation, now a very reliable plane indeed, was grounded at the beginning after a fatal crash caused by faulty electrical equipment. And of Douglas's first DC-6s two came down in flames before a Civil Aeronautics Board investigation revealed that gasoline fumes were leaking out and being ignited by the plane's heater, setting fire to the cargo hold.

All of these things were corrected in the only way they ever are, by discovering all the hidden bugs in the ship as it performed. One may similarly assume that the bugs in the Comet will be quickly found, and that the bigger, longer-ranged Comet IIs and IIIs now coming into production will be safer planes. Whether they are or not, the memory of the fatalities will die as quickly as those of any train wreck or automobile collision.

Accidents cannot set jet transport back. If anything, they will accelerate its development. For there is now an international race for supremacy in jet transports. America's own Pratt \& Whitney has completed the J- 57 engine which is the most powerful now in production-the first to exceed 10,000 pounds of static dry thrust. It is around this engine that Boeing is building its transport, which is expected to be ready for test flights in August: As the British tried to overleap all the American advantage in piston development, Boeing is trying, with this plane, to overleap all the British superiority in transport jets. Not even the Comet III will have enough range to fly the Atlantic without stopping to refuel. Boeing is trying to build a plane that will. Moreover the Comet III will hold no more than 80 passengers. Boeing's is being built to hold 120 .

However, not all British hopes rest with the

Comet. Vickers-Armstrongs is building a jet transport designed to fly upward of 600 mph with 100 to 150 passengers and able to cross the Atlantic nonstop. This jet is being built for the Ministry of Supply whereas Boeing is taking its gamble without any orders from any airline or any developmental subsidy from the Government. Other American builders have held back so far in the belief that a money-making jet transport cannot yet be designed and that, as a consequence, no U.S. airline would buy it. This seems to be gainsaid by Rickenbacker's eagerness to get jets, but C. R. Smith, boss of American Airlines, the biggest in the U.S., sings another tune. "We can't go backward to the jet," he says. "I'm interested in cheap transport and a more efficient machine, not in more expensive machines." Indeed, it is true that Boeing's 707 is likely to cost $\$ 3.5$ million or more as against $\$ 1.7$ miliion for a Super-Constellation.

The new battle will be between turbojets-pure jets-and turboprops which use the power of the gas turbine engine to drive a propeller. The major drawback to jet transports is that they are efficient only on relatively long flights-and that they gulp fuel so rapidly that any "stacking up" at airports eats up their profits. Turboprop transports, which are slower, can make short-haul flights efficiently and can stack up indefinitely at no great cost. The probable outcome is that both ships will be the planes of the future, each for its own proper purpose. What the next stop after that will be, nobody knows. Last week Jimmy Doolittle, who was the first man ever to take a bomber off from a carrier deck, predicted that it will be an atomic-powered plane and that it will come within 25 years. Such a plane would be theoretically possible now except for the great weight required by the shielding to protect the occupants from radioactivity. Few would dare predict that man's ingenuity will not find a way around that.

# PORT OF CALL: THULE 

## U.S. air base at the top of the world is now operational

The frozen scimitars of vapor slashing the polar sky tell of a nesting place somewhere below for the streaking jets up near the world's top, almost exactly midway between Washington and Moscow. Six miles down on the thick-frozen crust of Greenland, 700 miles north of the Aretic Circle, the mighty Thule Air Base is now operational. Here, at the strangest of all U.S. overseas outposts, the looping fighters are on ceaseless missions, guarding the U.S. against atomic attack.

A year aud a half ago Lire (Sept. 22, 1952) showed the first half of the great Thule feat: the building of the base. Now it visits Thule again to show the second half: Thule functioning. The base is set in a barren valley on the vast Danish island a few miles from the permanent icecap and only five hours away by jet bomber from Russian industrial centers.

As the year's last sun faded, Thule (pronounced "Tooley") girded for the long winter of 24 -hour nights, the 60 -mile winds and the $40^{\circ}$ below. With the sea frozen over, the base became perhaps the only true, complete airman's world. For nine months the only road in is the skies. From a 32,000 -pound snowseraper, heaviest item ever airlifted, to lipstick for three Thule females (nurses), all must be flown in. The 3,000 airmen live with their runway, built to take the mightiest bombers, their warehouses, bulging with thousands of spare plane parts, and their bowling alleys', soda fountains and Turkish bath. For some creatures it was a little too much of an air world. The seals and the walruses, apparently having enough of the roar of airplane engines in their ears, departed for still farther north, followed by the few Thule Eskimos who live off them.

## THE LAND OF 2-FOR-I DUTY

Descending, sometimes through a $40-\mathrm{knot}$ blizzarl, Thule's pilots sit down in an ancient glacier bed now set with aluminum barracks, steam plants and huge hangars, and with the lights lorever burning now in the long Arctic niqht. The barracks, where the men live two to each steatn-heated room, are really enormous refrigerator boxes in reverse, insulated to keep the cold out instead of in. Pastures of swelling fuel tanks stand silhouetted against another memento from glacial times, mesalike Mount Dundas, one of the Arctic's most striking landmarhs. The tanks are precious to Thule for they would feed the hungry bombers which, should the U.S. be attacked, would stage here for rapid counterblows.

Multi-million-dollar Thule was constructed by the U.S. under a 99 -year lease from her NATO ally, Denmark, of which Greenland is a

part. The costliest base ever built, it is a welldefended treasure. Where not so long ago Peary rigged Eskimo dog sleds for his push to the North Pole with nature as his only enemy, his engineer son helped fashion radar sites to warn of human foes. Some 1,400 miles from Russian soil airmen keep ready for the parachute attack which might descend on the basc itself in sudden war. In frequent "red" alerts the men snap into their parkas and their bunuy boots, grab carbines, and gloves to keep their hands from freezing in secouds to the metal, charge down the icy roads and sprawl into position on the frozen fringes of the runway. Thule, despite its bowling alleys and its Turkish bath, is rugged duty-two-for-one duty. In measuring a man's service time, the Air Force figures that a year at Thule buys two years anywhere else on the overseas duty market.

## BLUE IGLOOS, 'RED' ALERTS

In Thule, and around it, the problem is first to survive and having survived to keep fighting planes aloft. For the pilot Thule is a tiny pockmark encircled by the vast frozen spaces of the polar sca and the icecap. Pilots new to Thule were convinced that to crash away from base would mean a quick death. Then fliers were plunked on the cap for a 48 -hour survival test. Carving an igloo, they found they could live indefinitcly inside their walls of bluish snow blocks. But the cap is still the yardstick of ruggedness. "If we went down in a wooded area," said one pilot, "it would seem like the Waldorf."
Thule's pilots, on wartime alert status ready to whoosh into the air in minutes, fly unceasing missions on watch for the real thing and practice on each other and the big bombers which fly up from the U.S. For four and onehalf mouths of the year when there is only uight they "fly into an inkwell." Despite the blackness the pilot must identify every aircraft he intercepts by an actual reading of its number. This calls for mancuvering only a shade short of that related by one pilot, who returned from an interception talking like an airloorue Baron Munchausen.
"I flew in on the aircraft until the radarscope showed I was flying 150 feet away from him," he began. "Then I was able to see a large black shape, blacker than the surrounding area. So I closed in. When I figured my wing tip was a few feet away from the number on his tail I switched on my wing tip lights but they weren't bright enough to read the number. The tower," the pilot wound up, "kept calling for identification so I had no option. I flow underneath, raised my canopy. Just as if I was reading Braille, I ran my finger along the number on his plane and finally got it."

## The Things They Do for Art

EVEN SUCCESSFUL ARTISTS HAVE JOBS TO AUGMENT THEIR INCOMES

The road of the young American artist to economic security is generally long and uphill. Very few painters or sculptors attract the attention of museums or rich art lovers while they are young. Even when they achieve the recognition that talent and maturity deserve, they still frequently face the awkward problem of eating. How the problem is solved in the case of five recognized professionals, all
of whom have had at least one New York exhibit of their work, is shown on these pages. Their occupations are odd, but this is no accident. Although some artists support themselves by teaching or by doing commercial work, still others find that the former dulls the edge of their main talent while the latter destroys it completely. To these, slinging hash is far preferable to painting trash.

## REALISTIC FUR CLTTER

Fifty-one-year-old Mark Baum has always kept two johs going -his painting and one other job to let him paint. Currently he is painting, since his "other job," cutting Persian lamb skins (above), is a seasonal one which lays him off from Christman to July 4 and gives him time for his art. He got interested in fur cutting about the time he got interested in painting. As he progressed artistically through classes at the National Academy to his first one-man show in 1929, he rose economically from errand boy to fur cutter. Working, he claims, has kept hipainting, like Top of a Toun (left), more realistic than abstract.


## ABS'TRACT BET TAKER

Like Painter Baum, 45-ycar-old Joseph Solman (left, with Sunlit W'indotes) has a seasonal job which helps him support a wife and two children but lets him paint for six uninterrupted months. From May through October during the horseracing season Solman stands behind a window at three New York tracks selling 85 show pari-mutuel tickets. To this he adds the $\$ 1,000$ to $\$ 1,200$ he averages yearly from the sale of his abstract canvases. A painter for 25 years, Solman had his first show in 1931 and to date has had 10 one-man exhibits, including a retrospective at the Phitlips Gallery in Washington.

## Florida official orders clean city campaign, building inspector takes him at his word, trouble starts

## MISSIONARIES TO MOPPETS

Baylor's student evangelists have own congregations of poor children

Baylor Lniversity, in Waco, Texas, is a middle-sizel institution (enrollment alout 5,500 ) known for its high-scoring foothall teams and for the intensity of its religion. A Baptist school, Baylor was founded to turn out ministers and Christian lay leaders. There is no drinking, smoking or dancing on the campus. Freshmen and sophomores have required midday ehapel three times a week. But there is one religious activity whieh is strictly voluntary and therefore is the best measure of the students' rcligious zeal. This is Baylor's off-campus crangelistic and mission service. Ahout 6 p.n. every Friday hetween 250 and 500 students gather in Iront of Waco Hall loaded down with hymnals. Breaking up into small groups, they set off into Waco's slum areas. At 40 to 50 different neighhorhood spots they hold their mission services, sometimes for adults but mostly for children with whom they feel they can often be more effective than grown-up ministers. One young missionary will

tell his even younger "parishioners" how he was saved "from the hell of a teen-age nob in Dallas." A coed will hote up a little pig to tell a moralistic story about a clean pig and a dirty pig.

Besides these neighborhood meetings the Raylor evangelists hold Friday serviecs at the crippled ehildren's hospital and the old people's home. On Saturdays they set up a public address system on Waco's. Shid Row and on Sundays hold services in the city jail. In between their weekly scrvices they visit parishioners in their homes, hring them food and elothes, talk to parents ahout the children's religious development. They do
 not try to emavert anyone specificalIy to the Baptist faith. Riek Braeher, 20 -sear-old eo-leader of the evangelists, says, "We only want people to aceept Christ. We want to give them something which has helped in our lives and can help in theirs. We don't try to tear poople down about how much they sin and stuff like that."

## Hardy Soviet girls sweep international ski meet

Even before compctition started at the international women's ski meet at Grindelwald, Switzcrland early this month, the Russian girls' tcam, making its first appearance outside Russia, was the center of attention. Team Leader Constantin Sorokin took one look at Grindelwald's famed ski lift, scoffed, "Ski lifts would not be approved in the Soviet Union. Sports without toil and sweat, without the satisfaction of self-denial and self-conquest are nothing more than amusement. Up by chair lift, down by gravity-what has that got to do with honest physical culture?"

The Soviet shiers did everything the hard way. They laboriously climbed the slopes in workouts. Each morning they rose before the sun, put on their navy blue sweat suits, took off on a brisk half-hour rum in the snow. Then they performed exercises and calisthenics (above) for another half hour. They did not take time out to visit the picturesque mountain village sponsoring the meet. "We are here as sports competitors and not as tourists," explained Sorokin.

In the races, self-conquest and self-denial got their just rewards. Showing superior form and stamina, the Russians swept the only two events they entered. They finished first and second in the relay race, and in the cross-country marathon the five Soviet starters won the first five places.

MIvy of the probleme which confront Dunalid Brackett, a lawyer living in Wiseasset, Maine, do not differ greatly from those of countless other ex-servicemen whose "establishment" in life was delayed from three to five years by the war. However, he is attacking those problems with a somewhat different point of view than most.

Don was called into the service before he could complete his college education. After three and a half years in the Army Air Corps, he worked for a year, then went to a law school in Boston under the G1 Bill of Rights. He graduated in 1949 and, after post-graduate work, was admitted to the Maine Bar on February 5, 1950. Two weeks later, he and

Parricia Dority, a former airline hostess, were married.
They settled in Wiscasset and bought an old, old house which they started to renovate. Don and Patt soon found, however, that starting a law practice in a strange and small community (population, 1,584 ) was something of a struggle. To augment his income, Don took part-time jobs. They were both getting "thirtyish"-and felt an urgency about getting a firm foothold in life. This feeling was accented even more when their first child was on the way.

At this point Don Brackett decided that sumething had to be done to give his wife and himself a greater
sense of security-something more concrete than their day-to-day existence had made possible. The question was, what could be done about it on his small and uncertain income?

Being a lawyer, Don reasoned that, just as people came to him for advice in legal matters because of his training, he in turn should seek the advice of a man with experience in solving family security problcms. As a result, he asked Charles Powers, a wellknown New York Life agent living in nearby Woolwich, for help.

Obviously, they could not set up an elaborate life insurance program on Don's income at that time. But they did arrive at a good basic policy which Don could build on as the years went on-a 85000 New York Life Family Income Policy. Charles Powers felt that this was an especially good policy for Donand it would provide Patt with a modest but steady income if anything happened to her husband.

Thus, when Pamela, the Bracketts' first child, was born at the end of 1950 , the first step in Don's long-range plans for his family had already been taken. When Ann, the second child, was born early in 1953, the second step was almost automatic; another $\$ 5000$ policy, similar to the first, to meet the growing needs of a growing family.

Today Don Brackett is still far from affluent. He still works part-time on other jobs to add to his growing income from his law practice. But he and Patt feel that they have made a good, sound start on some important long-range plans for themselves and their children. Don has the assurance that if he should happen to die before his time, his wife would have a definite income of $\$ 100$ a month from New York Life until both children finished high school. Or, if he lives to retirement age, those same policies will provide him with an income of about $\$ 72$ a month-a good start for the retirement plan he and Charles Powers hope they'll be able to work out as time goes on.

# High School Set's New High Style 

IT APPEALS TO THE BOYS, APPALLS THEIR PARENTS by Rudolph Elie

AV angry-looking man, steering the elbow of a boy of 14 or so, came stomping into Sam's Clothes Shop in Lynn, Mass. "Are you the manager of this place?" he asked indignantly, glaring at mild-mannered, amiable Sidney Welans, who readily admitted that he was. "Then what do you mean selling my son a get-up like this?" cried the outraged father.
Sidney, looking over the young man's attire, saw nothing surprising about it. The boy's suit was a glowing ncon-blue. His jacket, which was almost as long as a topcoat, buttoned on a single button somewhere near his knecs, making his shoulders look only slightly narrower than a garage door. His shirt, of an iridescent, boiledshrimp pink, had an outsize collar whose billowing roll spilled out over the jacket. At the neck it
was gathered by a tie resembling a black shoestring. At the ankle his trouscrs had been narrowed to an opening so small that zippers had been installed to make it possible for them to be put on. His hair was crew-cut at the top but at the temples was worn full so that it could be brushed back over the ears to form a splendid, breaking wave like a duck's tail feathers. To Sidney Welans' expert eye the young man was the very glass of fashion and the mold of style-High Style, that is.
"What are you trying to do," the boy's father demanded, "take advantage of the kid? Look, it's two sizes too big for him."
"Three," said Sidney. "Dave takes a 36 regular but he bought a 39 long."

Sidney Welans' store was not much to look at -a couple of old barnlike buildings on the wrong

side of the tracks. But it was one of the nation's headquarters for lligh Style, a peculiar dementia sweeping the ranks of U.S. male adoleseents like brush fire through a canyon. So Sidney Welans, through lang experience, knew what to do. "I'll exehange the suit, if you want," he said patiently, "or give the boy his money back. But that's the size he wanted and I don t think he'll settle for anything else." This last was a prospect the father had not considered. Some of his anger seemed to change to lright as he turned on the young man. Dave, whose resentful face was now flushel deep with humiliation and smoldering anger. shook his heal determinedly. "This is the outfit I want and the one I'm going to have. I don't care what pa or ma or anyone thinks-it's my money."
Needless to say, he kept the suit. Hundreds of fathers are eneountering similar defeats every day in such stores as Todd's in Detroit, King's in Pitsshurgh, Johnnie Walkers' in Milwaukee, Alley's in Brook. lyn, Smoky Joe's in Chicago and the Union Clothing shop in Kansas City. Most of such skirmishing takes place in the eities of the East and West coasts; High Style affeets a smaller percentage ( $5 \%$ to $25 \%$ ) in the Midwest, and its influence becomes evident again in such citics as Los Angeles.

Most of the indignant fathers have never even heard of High Style until it walks in the door. This inahility of most parents to notice High Style on anyonc except their own offspring is one of the discase's most salient charaeteristies. Numberless adults are blissfully unaware of the Mr. B collar, the Five-Way jacket, Rogue pants, the Mr. C shirt or the Jungle jachet. not to mention the D.A. haireut. For many, the first discovery of these things on a loved one brings almost as severe a trauma as if an unmarried daughter had brought home a baby. It arouses the sinking feeling that junior, somehow, is going, or has already gone, wroug.

Parents may relax. Onee understood. High Style is obviously quite harmless. The Mr. B collar is simply onc big enough to billow. The Five-Way jacket is an Eisenhower-type jacket in extreme cut and lavish color with a violently contrasted quilted lining and a double collar that may be arranged in five different ways-e.g., buttoned, unbuttoned, hoth collars buttoned standing up, both buttoned down, and ane collar buttoned up with the other buttoned down. Rogue pants are as black as a panther exeept where their inverted pleats give peehs of a contrasting white material at the waist. The Mr. C shirt is like an ordinary button-down Oxford exeept that the collar is oversize, permitting it to be turned over and buttoned wrong side to, giving a sort of potato-peel curlicue effect. The Jungle jacket is made of black and yellow spotted material resembling a leopard skin. The D.A. haireut. like Dave's. resemhles a duck's back.

The lexieon of High sityle points to still other refinements. There is, for example, the Too B shirt. a dazzling item with a colossal white

collar and French cuffs on a pink shirt. There are Mexican shirts with Gaucho sleeves. There are combinations of sailor pants with bullfighter pants (a double row of eovered buttons on tight-fitting trousers). Most High Style suits use "link buttons" whieh are sewn on the underside so that, instead of lying flat, the cont projeets as if someone were pulling at it.

Once the mysteries of nomenclature are solved, parents may still justifiably wonder how in the world boys were ever ahle to find stuff like that. One answer is that originally many of them rolled their own, simply snipping off the two top huttons of a three-button jaeket and then rolling all semblance of erease out of the lapels until they curved gently down to the bottom in the coveted $V$-shaped wedge. This was soon observed and turned into mass production by the nimble U.S. garment industry which has, for anything resembling a trend, a sixth scnse that borders on precognition. Soon ready-made High Style was on the market.
The Welans of Lynn. as typical High Style vendors, draw from a wide source of supplies. They buy their ties from Cy. II arhs of Now York's Madison Avenue ("You get with them," says Sid. "the

minute you see them"). Topcoats-with pleated backs and pockets -are supplied by New York's Maury Prager, even in white ("The guy's got courage"). In shirts, New York's Fredwin is described as "the heppest of all." The sharpest suits come from Philadelphia's J. Maimon. The Five Way jacket is sold by Web Jacket of Detroit.

The Welans themselves have helped create new varieties. Sidney's wife Jerry devised a new outside seam for trousers. "I can't even sew a button," she says, "but I had a hunch it was a hot item. So Sid and I' went to New York to tell Johnny Vito about it because Johnny's the best pants man in the country. I drew him a sketch of the stitch and he got with it the second he saw it. His manufacturer didn't have a machine that could do the stitch, but on Johnny's word alone he agreed to restyle his machines for immediate production. It cost $\$ 35,000$ for restyling. Those fellows have real courage and imagination. They'll take a chance on anything if they dig the idea." The Welans, who live in a daily buzz of High Style lingo, now talk it themselves almost unconsciously.

High Style has becn cxtremely profitable for the Welans and other U.S. merchants who were the first to spot the trend. Once the word spread that Sam's Place was Mr. Z. (the end, the ultimate), the crowds grew day by day. Recently the Welans graduated out of their dilapidated barns into new air-conditioned quarters (on the right side of the tracks) with a plate-glass front, neon signs as bright as the neon-blue suits and a pink safe which rivals the Mr. B shirts for splendor.

The utmost parental vigilance cannot thwart High Style in the areas where it has taken hold. Not all its victims, like Dave, hold the trump card of earning their own money, but those who cannot buy a High Style suit can easily convert their own in the manner described abore. Cuffs, of course, are pegged to order ( 14 or 16 inches, as against the normal 19 -inch cuff), but a boy who cannot afford new pants can peg his own with safety pins. The D.A. haircut requires nothing more than finding a barber who is not a square (i.e., one who would think it was named for the district attorney).

## 'The boy never loses'

0NCE a boy has aequired, through his own more or less surrep. titious efforts, the approximation of High Style, he broaches the subject of a ready-made High Style suit to his parents. Stubborn, willful, insistent, he at length persuades his mother to go with him to a High Style shop. The mother takes one look at the bruised-strawberry, high-wedge model with inverted pleats, saddle stitching on the lapels and single-link button-then marches out appalled, followed by her pleading, humiliated son. "There'll be a month or more of the bitterest family rows," the Welans say, "but they'll be back. The boy never loses."
The boy promises to keep his ears clean, to hang up his suit, even to press it himself if she'll only let him have it. He swears he'll take out the garbage regularly, stop quarreling with his sister -anything, if she'll only let him have it. The mother, wavering, at last gives her blessing, but on condition that the father come down and have a look at it. The father, on seeing what his boy wants, almost loses his mind. Another awful squabble begins, ending only when the father, unable to stand it any longer, strides furiously out to wait it out in the car. Around Eastertime, Market Street near Sam's is lined with fathers waiting in their cars.
The boys' rejection of parental taste, it is interesting to note, does not extend to formal clothes. Again and again, renting tuxedos for the first time, the boys fall for High Style dinner jack. ets in off or mixed colors against the counsel of the Welans, who know what will happen when the boy gets home. Presently the boy is back at the shop with his pearl-gray tuxedo. "Ma won't let me wear it," he reports affably enough. "She says it'll clash with the girl's gown and so 1 have to get either a black or a white jacket." He does, too, without murmur.
Some boys who have neither a little income of their own nor a family to buy for them often resort to stealing the clothes they are so desperate to own. High Stylers and Hiph.Stylers-Io-he eswarm into Sam's after school or in the evening after after-school work. "With a crowd around we can't watch everything." says Sid, "and somethin's's sure to be tucked under a jacket or stuffed into a pocket." But the Welans look at it philosoplically because the thefts are a fine indicator of new trends.
"Once, for instance," said Sid, "we weren't sure about a certain shade of bluc. We thought it might be just a little too stupefying. So we put out a few pairs of pants to see how they'd go. They went: 10 of them stolen in one afternoon. So we reordered

and that number has been one of our best sellers ever since."
Who are the boys? "Our boys are a cross scetion of the average high sehool kid," says Jerry Welans, "some of them from the very best families in town and some of them not. Some are on their way to eollege and some are on their way to a bench job. There is no typical High Styler." The Welans' stock boy, Bob West, a handsome, quiet-spoken boy of 17 with dark red hair (in a modified D.A.), is a star hoekey player and president of the senior class at the Lynn Classical High Sehool. Bob deseribes himself as a "conservative" High Styler. This is to say that he would wear the wedge-lype jacket in a powder blue but not wear a white suit with black-velvet-covered square buttons or a tongue-pink suit with a pearl-gray tuxedo-type vest also equipped with hlack velvet buttons. Nor would he wear a Jungle Jacket. Why does he wear any High Style at all? Becausc, he says, "I picked it out myself and because I love it, but mostly, I guess, because all the other guys do too." He plans to enter Tufts College next year, and when he gets there he'll wear what all the other Tufts boys do. "T'd be crazy if I didn't, wouldn't I?"
According to the Welans, the boys who go for High Style carry themselves taller and straighter, take better personal care of themselves in such matters as fingernails and ears, and go about proudly, even elaterly. In Bob's doubtless enthusiastic estimate about $75 \%$ of the boys in his school are High Style-conscious. "Some of the boys just don't get with it," Bob says, "They ignore it as if it didn't exist at all. Usually they aren't very hep in music or in hot rods and things like that, either. We all get along all right with them provided they don't make any eracks about us."
Family haekground seems to have little to do with the High Style fever. "A North Shore boy of a fine family eame in here late this summer," Jerry Welans recalls. "A year ago he was the sharpest of the sharp but now he was entering an Ivy League college and didn't hnow what to wear. I told him the uniform was a gray flannel, three-button, center-vent jacket without shoulder padling, with some chino pants and dirty white bueks or cordovans plus a regimental or striped tie. He was astonished. He had never noticed this uniform and could hardly believe it existed. I told him to take a walk through the llarvard Yard. He did and came bach a week or so later wearing the uniform. 'lanok,' he said, 'Tm Ivy League.' He was, too; even the D.A. was gone."

Actually, the Welans point out, there has always been a "high" style in men's chothes. It is as old as the instinet of the male to deek himself out in fine raiment, whether in the pleated loincloths of the ancient Egyptians, the lace euffs and velvet breeehes of Louis XIV's day, or merely the wasp waists and the pegged cuffs of a century ago (abore). Nobody knows exactly how the

present form got under way. The Welans think it first found acceptanee in Harlem in the zoot suit (whieh the High Style suit is definitely not). However, it is not found at present to any extravagant degree among Negroes, though Singer Billy Eckstine, whose billowing oversized eollars helped to get the jive set to wearing Mr. B shirts, seems to have had a good deal to do with starting the current craze.

Some of the High Style terminology frightens many a father into sudden fears that his pride and joy has fallen into a nest of female impersonators. Their fears are largely groundless. The High Stylers suffer no visible loss of manliness and soon outgrow the fad.
"By the time a boy is 20 or so," says Jerry, "he's beginning to settle down a little, to find himself, to lave more assurance and poise. And

Nobody: the guy's successful. Only now he has a son It years old whe's a High Styler and it drives him erazy."
Jerry, herself the mother of two younger boys, is a stanch defender of the lligh Stylc adoleseents. "After all," she says, "what is more normal than for a little bey to want to run around in his cowhoy suit or ludian suit making believe that he is somebody else? What is more accepted than a Shriner putting on his fez or a Legionnaire putting on his eootic suit, or a drum majorette putting on her white silk shako, and all of them, for a time, being what they are not? So why should adolescent boys, who need a costume more at that particular time in their lives than they ever will again, be criticized or sneered at?
"Before, they've been model little boys happy in their Boy Scouts, their elubs or their church activities, their sports and games. But when this thing begins, everything starts to change. They drop out of the Scouts. They get surly. Camping out bores them. They won't do any work around the house or eooperate with the family at all. They cry more bitterly when they get upset than they did as ehildren. Many a time we've had boys come in here red-cyed after a battle with their parents because they can't have the shirt or suit they want. And lots of times we've heard them say something like "Don't they realize I'm still a kid?'"

The unusual "line ring" was to invite some 700 people to a special thank-you party given by the 42-vear-old Kalihoff twins, Anna and Erna, who without great pluek and resoureefulness and the entire town's help would have wasted their lives as helpless victims of paralysis.
Paralyzed fron the waist down almost all their lives, Anna and Erna grew tired of their uselessness 11 years ago and decided to go in business.

They began by making costume jewelry from sea shells, took up repairing antique chairs and bahing cahes for weddings and women's socials. Their first profits went into a molurized wheel chair. A month later Alma's citizens presentel them with a -econd such vehicle, while several stores and the Lutheran ehureh construeted ramps so they could ride right inside from the street. Around the housc the twins still use two old maple sticks to pull dowa things from shelves, to hang up their clothes and to dust. Said Erna, "We've caught everything with those stieks execpt husbands."
