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

"The day was D-plus-two, the drink was a Norman applejack called Calvados, and the party was a French wake in my honor. I had been reported dead by a sergeant who had seen my body floating on the

water with my cameras around my neck. . My death had become official and my obituaries had just been released by the censor. The sudden materialization of my thirsty ghost filled my friends with disgust at their wasted sentiment

Robert Capa's friends all over the world wish that he would turn up again with an equally convincing denial of the report of his death in the rice fields of northern Indochina last week. But he couldn't because the report was true.

The swashbuckling legend which-with reason-enveloped Capa endeared him to his many friends in journalism. But they also thoroughly respected him as a professional. They understood his motives when he left LIFE to found in

1947 a cooperative photo agency called Magnum. They were glad that he never got the cable waiting for him in Hanoi which told that one of his Magnum colleagues. Werner Bischof, had died in an accident in Peru, Like Capa, Bischof hated war-as his photographs showing the plight of Korean children (starting on p. 178) amply demonstrate.

Along with his colleagues, the brass, headed by the Commanderin-Chief (see picture), has always appreciated Capa. There isn't much that Life can add to the tributes he has received. He was not a photographer for photography's sake. One thing always important to him was to communicate what he had found out. He was in Indochina

on a Life assignment and last week his pictures of Laos told how war was coming to that sleepy kingdom. Then he moved on to the fighting in the Delta to take his last pictures.

To get these pictures to the U.S. in time for this issue of LIFE seemed almost impossible, but we have resorted to every production device we know to get his account to a nation which must soon make up its mind about Indochina. Life bureaus east and west en route from hardto-reach Saigon were alerted to expedite the film. In Paris correspondents and photographers rushed the last of three Capa shipments out of customs, through a laboratory and into the hands of a passenger flying to New York. What struck everyone was the cooperation of

French customs, airline officials and the passenger when they heard the pictures were Capa's last take. As this is written on May 30 we're doing, rather than saving, what we think are the right things. For words we give you Ernest Hemingway in a cable from Madrid: "He was a good friend and a great and very brave photographer. It is bad luck for everybody that the percentages caught up with him. . . . He was so much alive that it is a hard long day to think of him as dead."

Born Andrè Friedmann in Budapest 40 years ago, he invented the name of Capa shortly after he left Hungary at 18, He soon was wrapped in a legendary mantle of bohemianism. He secreed possessions and was devoted to the ideals of freedom; he frequently lacked cash and always loved good living; he poured mock insults on his friends-and unexpected kindnesses. In World War II the brass came to respect him for his knowledge of taeties (the late Brig. General Theodore Roosevelt once said. "Bob knows more about the art of war than many four-star generals"). Combat soldiers revered him for his relaxed, wisceracking, unhelievable bravery in desperate situations.

HE SAID: 'THIS IS GOING TO BE A BEAUTIFUL STORY'

TIME-LIFE correspondent who was with Capa on his last mission

In the bug-ridden room of a Nam Dinh establishment which calls itself the Modern Hotel (fin English), Bob Capa sucked a glass of warn cognace and sod and made a pronouncement: "This is may be the last good war. The trouble with all you guys who complain so much about French public relations is that you don't appreciate this is a reporter's war. Noboly knows anything and nobody tells you anything, and that means a good reporter is free to go out and get a beat every day."

Caps and I had been ouring French outposts in the besieged Red River Delta with General René Cogny, French commander in northern Vietnam. Next day we were going out with a 2,000-man task force which was to relieve, then evacuate, two garrisons some 60 miles south of Hanoi. Caps prepared for the mission with professional fine-see: a thermoo of iced except matches. Caps never had matches, presumably because other people could be counted on for such obvious tiems.

When the jeep appeared at 7 a.m. May 25 we climbed in along with Scripps-Howard Correspondent Jim Lucas. Waiting for the Red River ferry just outside Nam Dinh, Capa announced, "This is going to be a beautiful story." I shall be on my good behavior today. I shall not insult people and I shall not even mention the excellence of my work."

On his delts tour Capa had got the idea of a picture story to be entitled "Bitter Rice." His plan was to dramatize the contrast of tanks next to peasants working in publies, of men dying in the struggle for the rice harvest. All morning he worked to photograph peasants carrying rice to market in straw baskets, plotding along the edges of vehicle-clogged roads. The sun beat down fercely. A few minutes later a tank began firing right behind us. The French were mortaring the village to our left and at 3:05 Moroccan infantrymen began advancing through the paddies to finish the job. I was making notes on this when a helmeted soldier arrived and spoke to the lieutenant in Vietuamese.

Without a trace of emotion the lieutenant said, "Le photographe est mort" ("The photographer is dead"). I understood the words but they didn't register and I said, "Pardon?" The lieutenant repeated the sentence in the same flat voice. This time the words registered, but I was certain I had misunderstood and said to Lucas almost as a joke, "This guy's trying to tell me Capa's dead."

Still deadpan, the lieutenant spelled out the English word with French

pronunciation of the letters: day euh aah tay aash (death). Simultaneously a second Vietnamese ran up and beckoned directly to me. The licutenant questioned him and relayed, "Maybe not dead but wounded

by mortar, très grave" ("very serious").

Lucas and I jumped up and ran with the soldier down the ditch. At the point where the road bent soldiers pointed up and over the road, then disappeared. We scrambled across the road and into a small lowland field. At the foot of the dike across the V formed by the bending road Capa lay on his back, the stump of his shattered left leg about a foot from a hole blown in the earth by the explosion. He also had a grievous chest wound. One camera was clutched in his left hand. I began calling his name. The second or third time his lips moved slightly like those of a man disturbed in sleep. That was his last movement. It was 3:10 p.m.

I called to a Moroccan soldier to get a medic. The medic, a husky Frenchman with a stretcher, took one look, shrugged and started to go. Then he turned and asked, "Camarade?" When I nodded he shrugged






THE BIG BLAST ON 'BIG BEN'

The 40,000-ton carrier Bennington seemed outwardly serene (above) as it came slowly up Narragansett Bay to its home base at Quonset Point, R.l. But "Big Ben" was a ship of death, Only a few hours before, a mysterious series of explosions had changed the smoothly efficient fighting ship into a nightmarish box of flame. Crew members were blown from their bunks.

Fuel lines burst, Bulkhead doors jammed, trapping men below, The confusion was hrief for fire-fighting and reseue teams, organized immediately, did a magnificent job of controlling the fire and rescuing the injured. But in the fierce flames and heavy smoke many were mortally burned and many suffocated.

As the Bennington came into Quonset the real drama shifted from the ship, where the crew was clearing the wreckage and administering to the injured, to the base itself. Relatives of crew members who had heard of the explosion were converging on the base and had begun to colleet in a movie theater (below). Hour after hour they waited, their silence occasionally broken by the sound of someone weeping. The ship's personnel officer had been killed and most of his records destroyed. There was no way of immediately identifying the injured and the dead and the Navy was anxious to avoid false or misleading reports. Finally in the late afternoon a telephone line was hooked up between the ship and the theater, and one by one those who had waited were able to talk to the survivors on board. As they heard their sons and husbands were safe, the effects of the long, tense waiting showed on their faces (right).

Even as the wreckage was being cleared the Navy appointed a board of inquiry to determine the blast's cause. The board's job was a tough one, for there seemed to be no reasonable clues to go on. Parts of the ship had buckled peculiarly; fabrics and clothing not to far from badly burned areas were unharmed; the the explosion had taken place in a part of the ship where there were no explosives. FRESH NOTE AT GENEVA

Amid all the nonsense and frustrations of the Geneva conference it is still possible now and then to discern the real issues, which are the fate of Korea, of Indochina, and of collective security. Last week U.S. Delegate W. Bedel Smith stated some issues in refreshing forthright words:

"Sixteen of our delegations believe sincerely that the people of Korea, from the Yalu to the southern shores, are entitled to our most earnest efforts to give them independence and unity. They deserve better than to be made the subject of a propaganda campaign...

"It is not too late to fulfill our objectives.
... All we need is the courage and will to accept honestly the reality of principles that have been expressed in our meetings....

"There must be clearly reaffirmed our respect for the authority and moral force of the United Nations....! will be a tragle day for all the peoples of the world if, as has been threatened here, the United Nations is discredited and condemned, if its resolutions are spurned as scraps of paper and if the peoples of the world are cast adrift without this anchor in which they have placed their trust."

WHEY FOOT, STRAW FOOT

Secretary of Agriculture Benson is having more trouble with whey than did Little Miss Muffet. Like his experience with butter, this one shows that special sales gimmicks will not cure the basic fallacy in the high level price support systems.

As a result of milk price supports Mr. Benson's department had on its hands over 600 million pounds of dried nonfat milk. He got the bright idea of selling it for use in animal feeds at one fourth its cost. Feed manufacturers snapped it up, cutting his surplus in half.

But another branch of the dairy business, the cheese manufacturers, have long relied on the feed market to dispose of their whey. So Benson had to promise that, if dried-milk marketings hurt the price of whey, he would protect them. Last week he had to deliver on this promise: whey, the latest necomer to a list of over 40 farm products, is now under price support.

support.

Meanwhile Benson's new farm bill, which would gradually lead us out of this mesensical treadmill of artificial prices and mounting surpluses, is stalled in committee.

To build the great pyramid of Giza, to laden its secret rooms and passageways with resaurest, the Pharaba Chcops almost destroyed the conomy of Egypt some 5,000 years ago. For years 100,000 people toiled, and Herochous reported the annual Bill for radishes, noines and garlie for the laborers at \$1\$ million. Most of Cheops' treasures were long ago stolen by vandals. But last week an Egyptologist named Kamal el-Malakh uncovered an unknown passageway near the pyramid which held a fabulous and untouched find. 





Deprived of the old-fashioned screened porch in his modern home, the American household-er is now being provided with a portable substitute. This is a room-size screened-in shelter that comes in sections and can be easily assembled almost anywhere. 

Pork production now at low point of year. In 1952 and 1953 farmers raised fewer hogs. Production decreased 20% in these two years. This year supplies are increasing but won't be ready for market until late summer.

Summertime advances in some pork prices do not indicate a permanent trend. Because of lower supplies of hogs, pork prices increase during summer months. They decline in late summer and fall as supplies increase.



Church film tells how John Wesley sought faith and founded Methodist Church

"Leisure and I have taken leave of one another," wrote Evangelist John Wesley in 1726. "I propose to be busy as long as I live. . . .' the 65 years that followed. Wesley not only founded the Methodist Church, but also found time to set up the first Sunday schools in England, write a treatise on how to cure rheumatism with electricity, and ride 225,000 tortuous miles on horseback to bring the gospel to the poor folk of England who had been generally ignored by the protocol-ridden, conservative Church of England, Once, when forhidden to speak in his dead father's church, Wesley preached successfully for seven nights, standing on his father's tombstone.

The zealous devotion of Wesley's life has been condensed into a semidocumentary movie, John Wesley, made for the church at cost by good Methodist J. Arthur Rank. Aimed mainly at church audiences, the film does not match the dramatic fire of last year's movie life of Martin Luther (Life, July 13, 1953). But it is deeply moving in its presentation of Wesley's struggle to feel the sudden, personal revelation of God's love, "the inward witness" of intense faith which lies at the heart of Methodism.



LITTLE WESLEY, only 5 feet 6 inches, walks between bulkier aides.

Wesley, who was a clergyman of the Church of England, never meant to found a new sect. But when in 1738 he began preaching that jailbirds could be saved as easily as virtuous men if they felt the power of God's love, the church, which felt that his fervor was encouraging licentious conduct, banned him from its pulpits. Forced to preach outdoors to poor people, and needing lay preachers to help in his work, Wesley began to ordain them himself. On his death at 87 in 1791, Wesley left as a memento-along with the chapel below—a vigorous Methodist movement of 154,000 members.

THE ARCTIC BARRENS

A frozen desert ringing the polar sea, the tundra quickens in the summer sun

Here where the fires of Phoebus touch the chariots of the Pole, In the luminous night the wheel of the sun burns with a flame Continuous, and the emulous night brings in the clear day.... RUFUS FESTUS AVENUS, Descriptio orbis terrarum

AR in the north where the fabric of the forest frays, unraveling in a fringe of ragged brush, the land opens upon a bleak and barren plain. Here, dramatically, the horizon recedes into the immense distance and the sky arches hugely above an interminable expanse of frozen prairie. This is the tundra—the arctic desert which rings the Northern Hemisphere below the polar sea.

Of all realms on earth only the Antarctic is less known, less accessible. For although the edges of the tundra have often felt the step of man, its interior remains, as it has through history, remote, invulnerable, maleficent. To civilizations of the past the Arctic was only dimly discernible. Save for the Icelandic sagas there is little in literature about the Far North and, until recent times, even less in history. A Greek explorer, Pytheas of Massalia, reputedly sailed up the coast of Norway in 325 B.C. until he attained a region where the sun hung long and late above the red horizon. Though his own accounts were lost, his voyage was celebrated by many writers, most notably by the Latin poet Avienus 700 years later. Sometime in the Ninth Century, Iceland was settled by the Norsemen, and in four years between 982 and 986 Eric the Red explored Greenland and founded a colony there. Although the later voyages of Henry Hudson and other explorers awakened interest in the geography of the North, it was only in the last century that the outlines of the polar landscape took shape in any detail. It was not until April 6, 1909 that man-in the persons of Commander Robert Peary, U.S.N., his Negro companion, Matthew Henson, and four Eskimos-reached the North Pole.

Although popular fancy tends to equate the arctic and antarctic regions, they differ enormously. The South Pole is situated on a continent surrounded by water, the North Pole in a sea surrounded by the land of the tundra. Owing to its great mass and high elevation the Antarctic has the most savage climate on earth; below 60° south latitude no human beings live nor any trees nor land animals larger than inseets. By contrast the Arctic is wastly more benign. Between 60° north latitude and the North Fol there are millions of human for more most of its land areas enjoy temperate and even warm weather. Snow melts, plasts bloom, birds flock from the south. Even the arctic sea never freezes solidly; its ice floes, though 10 to 100 feet thick, circle the Pole in slow, incressant motion.

Unlike the Antarctic, which lies still in the grip of a glacial age, the Arctic is not a homogeneous region, but contains within itself two climatic zones. One is the polar region proper which embraces

those parts of the polar sea, Greenland and a number of other islands where snow and ice never vanish, even in summer, the other is the tundra, where for two or three months out of 12 the face of the land turns green. The word tundra is of Lapp or Finnish origin, but it has passed into many other languages with many shadings of meaning. In its widest international sense it defines the cormous reaches of bleat, treeless plains encircling the earth between the polar sea and the world tree line, overlying most of northern Canada, Shieria, Russia, the Scandinavian countries and parts of Alaska. It exists only in the north; there is no tundra in the Antarctic.

Although here and there its flat countenance is wrinkled with occasional mountains and rivers, as in Siberia, or pocked by fields of frost-shattered rock, gravel or sand, as in Canada, for the most part the tundra rolls away, mile after empty mile, featureless and undifferentiated save for the innumerable lakes and ponds that blue-

spangle its monotonous expanse. Although the tundra covers onetwentieth of the earth's surface, it is largely unexplored and uninhabited. In Canada, for example, the barren lands cover approximately 400,000 square miles of a great triangle sprawling between the Mackenzie River, Hudson Bay and the shores of the Arctic Ocean. It was in the approximate center of this huge wilderness that a Life expedition, which had been flown in, encamped many weeks under the most rigorous circumstances to obtain photographs for this article.

The flatness of the tundra is partly the consequence of the titanic glaciation of the Pleistocene epoch when the great ice sheets freighted the earth. For tens of thousands of years their enormous mass lay upon the tundra regions, scouring the tops of hills and ridges, planing away all angles, grinding the face of the land. Now, across most of the tundra, a mound a few hundred fect high may loom like a mountain peak, visible 20 miles away. It is only when the sun hovers close on the horizon that its level rays suddenly define with highlight and shadow the faint profile of the arctic plain.

The distinctive feature of the tundra and, indeed, its architect and sculptor is permafrost, the name given by geologists to permanently frozen ground. Yet the congealing frost that solidifies the soil to depths of hundreds of feet is not completely permanent. Each summer the topmost few inches thaw, permitting the growth of arctic vegetation. It is this limited thaw that gives the tundra its special

character. It does not penetrate deep enough to encourage the roots of trees, save for a few stunted, specialized forms. Nor does it go deep enough to permit efficient surface drainage. Hence most of the rain and snow that descends is trapped in numberless lakes and ponds which form in every small depression and cover half of the tundra surface. Since the permafrost hardens the land almost to the solidity of stone, erosion by wind and water is reduced to a minimum and the few rivers that crease the tundra meander to the polar sea between flat and shallow banks. The southernmost extension of continuous permafrost-the permafrost line-marks the lower limit of the tundra and the approximate upper limit of the world's forests, It is here that the Arctic begins and ends, Although circumpolar, the permafrost line is extremely irregular, dipping far south in certain regions, such as the shores of Hudson Bay, and veering 1,500 miles to the north, high above the Arctic Circle, in the western portions of Canada and much of Siberia.

For nine months of the year the heart of the mainland tundra lies in the long clutch of winter. Day ly day from Spetuperbe crownd, the sun settles lower and lower toward the horizon, and the nights grow ever longer. Lakes and ponds vanish under sheath of ice, and flowing waters are stilled. The first snows come early, and though generally light, quickly wore the barrens, softening had forms and converting all the world into an infinite, curvarying monochrome. On days of overeast the white hand and the white sky seem to blend into an end-less void. North of the Arctic Circle the sun drops below the horizon in early December and then the great cold descends and the skies shimmer and glow with the ghostly fires of the autora borealis. Not until nid-January—and even later in higher lattices—does the sun return briefly, casting pale rays across the frozen earth but presaging no string for many a month.

Toward the end of May, when the sun once more circles the horizon day and night, the snows melt and the ice on rivers and lakes breaks up noisily, casting welrdly shaped blocks on the muddy shores. Ver this early spring does not at once alleviate the desolation. For now the melt waters collect in dank pools, drowning lichen and moss. Chouls mass and curtains of mist enshroud the sulfen land. It is not till the middle of June that the arctic plants begin to stain the sodden earth with green. Then swiftly, miraculously, warmed and nourished by the constant sun, flowers appear—forget-me-nots, lupins, poppies—bejweing and transfiguring the landscape. The muddly shores of lakes and streams become gilded with gold and green. Birds arrive from the south and load insects fill the air.

From May to July there is no darkness. At night, when the respints aun poises briefly below the rim of the horizon, the sky remains suffused with life-breathing light. It is in this brief interlude of summer that the tundra comes fully alive. Hundreds of species of arctic plants spread across the logs and make; marshes, transforming drab straw-colored expanses of brittle stalks and desiceated moss into lush earpets of green. But the green soon turns to rel and gold, for the first bleak breath of autumn comes out of the North before August ends. By late September the land again is white.

Though sections of the tundra have been inhabited by aborigines for thousands of years, to the eyes of civilized man its principal quality is loneliness. From time to time strings of caribou wander across the central wastes. Here and there musk oxen or solitary bear appear. In summer there are birds and incomputable hordes of mosquitoes, For most of the year, however, the tundra stands as an ultimate wilderness, empty and austere. Yet for some men who have known it the tundra has its fascination-the enchantment of open space and sky, of untouched nature and untrodden land. And to a few who call it home the tundra sometimes appears a place of beauty, A Caribou Indian once remarked to a priest who had been trying to convey to him an idea of the Christian heaven: "My father, you have told me that heaven is very beautiful. Is it more beautiful than the country of the musk ox in summer, when sometimes the wind blows over the lakes, and sometimes the water is blue and the loons cry very often? That is beautiful, and if heaven is still more beautiful, my heart will be glad, and I shall be content to rest there till I am very old."

THE CLIMATE OF THE TUNDRA

 $\begin{aligned} & \text{NO place on earth experiences such vast annual extremes of weather be such act rate tundar. In winer it is soller than the lee-packed arctise sea, coller than the North Pole itself, For the oceans tend to warm the polar area, while the more southery had masses it is effigierated in winter beneath their shields of snow and ice. Although the temperature never dropps below <math display="inline">-62^\circ$. F. in the arctic is peak, a weather station on the fringe of the Canadian tundra once recorded a low of -62° Fe, and comparable temperatures have been reported in the tundra bordering Husbon Bay. The lowest temperature ever known on earth, -95.6° Fe, was recorded at Verkhoyansk below the southern edge of the Siberian tundra, 1,500 miles from the North Pole. In summer, however, the acrie tundra basks in the rays of the everpressent sun. Temperatures of 50° are normal and days of 60° and 70° not uncommon. A record high of 100° was once reported at Port Yukon.

By contrast again with the bitter Antarctie, the arctic tundra is one of the least stormy regions on earth. During the sviniter it is overhung with a semipermanent high-pressure air mass, characterized by still, dry air. Since daily variations in temperature are slight, owing to the seant hours of sun in winter and its continual effect in summer, the tundra seldom experiences the fluctuating air movements that expender changes in weather. Strong winds are infrequent. (The average for the Canadian turdra is 6 mpb. 18 its principally in spring and fall that storms descend. Even so, total precipitation for the tundra averages only 11 inches a year—less than in certain desert areas. Warm-weather rains account for most of this; the annual snowfall in the Canadian barrens is less than the equivalent of two inches of water.

It is a paradox of the tundra that it combines innumerable lakes, marshes and begs with an arid climate. Yet three solden wastednake are created largely by the poor drainage imposed by the permafrost beneath the surface. Today, as world temperatures rise, the permafrost appears to be creterating by a few hundred feet a year. If it disappears entirely, permitting drainage, while rain and snowfall remain the same, the tundra may sometaly become the greatest desert on earth.

A WIDE LAND FOR WANDERING

IIKE all harsh, uncompromising lands the tundra shapes the habits of the animal inhabitants. Some are by disposition solitary while others seek the company of their fund. Yet, singly or in groups, the creatures of the tundra must wander ceaselessly across the barren plains in quest of food. Bound tegether by mutual necessity and common impulse, companies of caribou, musk oxen, artic hares and patraingan punctuate the solitude of the wilderness.

Of all the tundra residents the most conspicuous are the earthou, or article dear. Unlike the domesticated European reindeer (from which they are virtually indistinguishable), the caribou are continually on the more. Travelling in extended ranks or files, they follow a generally predictable migratory pattern, seldom diverging from a chosen route even when pursued by wolves or goaded by the fierce files that harry them unendurally in the summer months. Their migrations are influenced in part by the exigency of finding new forage grounds and in part by the reproductive instinct.

The only other large gregarious mammal of the tundra is the musk ox. Where the earthou population of the Canadian fundra is estimated at about 750,000, the musk ox seems to have been reduced in numbers. Today there are only a few hundred left on the mainland, with perhaps another 35,000 scattered along the coasts of Greenland and some of the arrive islands. They are extinct in Europe and Asia, Unike the carbou which ranges restlessly over many thousands of square miles, the musk ox tends to stay at home, often passing his entire life in a radius of a hundred miles. In some ways he is better equipped than the earlbou for existence on the open tundra. His dietary demands are as simple and he has the same ability to forge undertext and the ferorious files of summer; his applity, heavy horns, and defensive tactics render him immune to wdves. Placid, unaggressive and highly cellibe, the musk ox has had one implaceble enemy man.

shrubbery—usually along river banks—seeking shelter in this meager cover from the occasional high winds that sweep the frozen prairie. In spring they return to the open lands, brown-feathered and black-barred, to nest on the bare

ground. Protected by their summer coloration, the nesting hirds are almost indis-tinguishable from the drab hummocks among which they sit and thus survive despite the hawks which circle overhead and the lean foxes that provd the barrens.

FIGURES IN THE EARTH

THE physical features of the tundra scene to exist in two dimensions. There are no great heights or depths, no goodgoard panoram as of mountains being uplifted or valleys carved. For untold years the underlying permafors has helped to preserve from the ravages of crosion the gentle contours of the tundra. Yet hland and immutable as its visage appears to be, the tundra has its lineaments which alter year by year. For the permafrost and winter cold that prevent deep, basic changes serve also to effect a great variety of minor changes in the few upper inches of the surface soil which annually are fiberated from the shackles of the ice. Here there is ceaseless activity, A result is the curious tundra phenomenon known as "patterned ground."

The patterns formed may take the shape of circles, polygons or

rine patients rotined may take the singue of creetes, polygons or stripes, clearly coulined by ranks of stones, lines of vegetation or stripes, clearly coulined by ranks of stones, lines of vegetation or count for these igners in the earth, one of the most generally accepted points to the process called multiglation: the periodic expansion and contraction of the soil during repeated freezes and thans. Patches of fine slit and eldy absorb more moisture than coarser soils. When the ground freezes, these finer materials, containing more water, undergo greater expansion; and the coarser materials—graved and stones.



a drained lake bed is cracked into patterned plaques by the drying action of the sun, so the tundra soil is dissected by the shrinking action of intense arctic cold, These polygons measure 30 to 50 feet in width. Eventually, as the angular


structures continue to evolve, each of them will develop a raised center. Shown here in mid-July, the polygons are bright with summer vegetation and checkered, with patches of shallow standing water, trapped in the forms by the raised edges.

—are threat radially outward in all directions. At the next thate the finer materials contract again, adhering together, while the stones and gravel remain where they were placed by the freezing action. This process, repeated season after season, eventually results in a sorting of soil materials wherein the stones are relegated to the outer rim of an ever-expanding circular figure ranging from a few inches to 30 feet in diameter.

But many other factors are at work shaping the geometry of the tundra surface, and its figures have many variants. Often polygons are formed. And often the circles and polygons are outlined by grooves instead of stones, which may remain distributed haphazardly in the central area; these are known as "nonsorted" patterns. On slopes the slow downhill creep of unfrozen soil over permafrost acts as a leveling agent on the tundra's land forms and sometimes elongates circles and polygons into vertical stripes. Vast areas of exposed bedrock are recurrently shattered and dissected by frost action. Here and there huge slabs have been heaved upward in a vertical position like the mysterious monoliths of Stonehenge, Elsewhere small columns of frozen soil, furred with vegetation, rise abruptly from the tundra floor. Most spectacular of all are the giant volcanolike mounds called pingos (above, left) crected by the tremendous pressures that occur when layers of unfrozen material are squeezed between a frozen top layer and the permafrost basement and erupt finally to the surface.

LIFE IN WINTER AND SUMMER

BOM any one perspective the undra sprawle between curved horizons like a forsaken void of nature, vacant of movement of olf file. arctic year unfolds. Even in winter, when lakes are frozen and the land lies blanketed in snow, a few hardy creatures stir on the inhospitable wastes. In the bright, warm months hordes of aummer visitors sweep up from the south and the muskeg marshes shimmer with the wings of many nigratory larks.

Unscarred by roads or human habitation, the tundra provides a vast natural habitat for the arctic animals that have adapted themselves to its exigencies and made it their domain. Here in the Thelon Game Sanctuary of the Canadian Northwest Territories—a wilderness

by a corresponding drop in yearly fox fur yields from the barren lands. In this season the barren-ground grizzly bear, mightiest animal of

the tundra, stalks hungrily across the russet plains. For all his fierce appearance he is not a threat to earibou or any of the larger mammals, but confines his predations largely to rodents like the ground squirrel whose private root caches he likes to raid. Essentially a vegetarian, he appears indifferent to such delicacies as the arctic grayling, even when one leaps from the water before his eyes. For the most part he fills his belly with a variety of arctic plants-masu root, licorice root, ARCTIC GRAYLING

berries-and occasionally when times are hard he will even down a few tufts of grass.

Gradually as the days of autumn wane, the sounds and movement of the summer fade with the fading sun. The last straggling platoons of caribou disappear over the southern horizon. The final echelons of geese pass overhead, knifing the air in clean formation, and the skies echo for the last time their lonely parting ery. Then silence descends upon the barren grounds. Soon the white snowflakes will fall and the tundra again will sleep in the immense solitude of the arctic night.



MARSH FLEABANE, a golden hemispherical cluster of many heads on a single erect stalk, is a flowering tundra plant that is able to grow only in wet, marshy muskeg of the southern aretic plains.

THE FLOWERING TUNDRA

All are uniquely adapted to arctic existence and will not survive in a temperate clime.

It is not so much the cold that gives the arctic plants their distinctive character as the short growing season and the arid climate. For nine months of the year its waters are locked away in ice, Its acid, loally drained soil is cold and sour, inhibiting roat absorption. 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



CORAL-LIKE LICHENS proliferate in the drier parts of the frozen earth and are among the most important food plants of the foraging earthou which must search out new grazing areas when these slow-growing primitive plants are depleted.



A BLACK FILIGREE is created by the Parmelia sorediata lichen growing on the smooth face of a glacier-borne boulder. The normally pink stone, here photographed just after sundown, has taken on an unearthly luminous purple hue.



LICHEN RING, spreading outward across the rock on which it grows, is formed by a sequence of death and rebirth. Each year the outer edge awakens from dormancy and spreads across the rock, while the center slowly dies and falls away.

THE LOWLY LICHENS


ALL across the barrens and in the uttermost reaches of the High Arctic the humble lichens—flat, rootless plants—cling to existence in areas where no higher forms will grow. Halted only by the barrier of perpetual snow, they thrive everywhere on earth, but they are especially suited to arctic life by virtue of their capacity to withstand cold and drought and to subsist on naked rock. Among the more primitive living things, they are usually the first members of a plant community to appear in barren ground, and as they propagate they provide an initial foothold for higher forms of vegetation.

The lichens' ability to live on rock derives from their dual nature. For lichens are composite entities, made up of two separate and dissimilar organisms, an alga and a fungus, united in an inextricable partnership. The fungus produces acids that disintegrate the rock, supplying necessary minerals to the alga; in return the alga supplies organic materials to the fungus which would die without them.

It is in great measure due to the lichens that the tundra wears its continuous plant cover. For they grow in the bleakest areas, carpeting whole landscapes to the exclusion of other plants. Many lichens are edible, most notably Cladonia, or reindeer moss, which provides the caribou with an important food source in the leanest times of year,



ORANGE LICHEN, the brightest in the Arctic, displays its strident colors on tundra rocks. Like all lichens this species (Caloplaca elegans) thrives on nitrogen and grows mostly on the sides of rocks where owls and hawks habitually perch.

THE TUNDRA AND MAN

N an overcrowded and tumultuous world where all the friendly, comfortable lands have long since been appropriated, the tundra looms on the northern horizon as an ultimate frontier. The eye of man has always rested covetously on open land, however inhospitable is surface aspect. Today the people of every national domain that impinges on the Arctic are scrutinizing the tundra with a new and inquisitive reach.

The peripheral lands of the Arctic are owned and administered by proprietary nations, specifically the six countries whose coasts encircle the polar sea. Of these barren dominions, 37% belong to Canada, 28% to the Sovie Union, 28% to Demank, 6% to the U.S. and 1% to Norway and Iceland. The wealth of the tundra is both animal and mineral. For centuries the flesh and hides of caribou and reinders and the pelts of smaller fur-bearing animals have provided an economic maintsay to Indians, Eskimos, Lapps and other aborigines of the Far North. In the last 100 years civilized man, probing successfully beneath the desolate barrens, has uncovered immense riches in gold and platinum, as well as many of the baser metals.

Although some sheep are raised in parts of Greenland and Icaland, the principal domestic animal of the tundra is the reindeer. To those dependent on it, the reindeer provides not only a source of meat but of milk, clothing, transportation and a variety of by-products such as furniture, mattresses, gelatin, felt, suche and

The fur trade has been the principal business of the Canadian tundra for nearly 300 years, ever since the Hudson's Bay Conpany received its charter from Charles II. In the great barren lands between Hudson Bay and the Mackenize River the unit of currency was the pelt of the white arctic fox, and it was through this medium that Indians and Eskimso surchased the products of civilization.

Today, however, the major focus of interest in all the tundra regions of the world is directed upon their still unexplored minineral resources. Although certain deposits—Swedish iron from the great mine at Kiruna, Russian nickel and copper from Noril'sk, and gold from Alaska—have been exploited for many years, new resources are constantly being discovered. Mining first surpased the fur trade as the major industry of the Canadian tundra in 1939. Today miners and prospectors are streaming out upon the barron lands in every country in quest of new mineral reserves. Gold, copper, lead, asbestos, beryllium, lithium, coal, off tundra. More important than any of these, the recent discovery and exploitation of tremendous from deposits on the edge of the Quebec tundra indicate the presence of ore reserves equal to any now known on earth.

The most dramatic development of recent years, however, has been the enormous, unspecified increase of production in the uranium deposits at Port Radium, on the shore of Great Bear Lake on the western edge of the Canadian tundra. Radium-bearing ores were first discovered there in 1930; by the end of 1933 a milling plant and refinery were in steady production. When nuclear fission became a possibility in 1939, the mine was enlarged and deepened. Today Canada stands (with the Belgian Congo) as one of the two forenost producers of urnatium in the world.

For all these past achievements and promises of future revaris, the tundra still holds on its expanses only widely scattered communities, many of them inhabited by hat a handful of people. The difficulties of living on the tundra derive no less from its rigorous climate than from the problem of transpartation. The Mackeniae River and the great waterways of the Siberian tundra provide north-and-south transport during the summer months.

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'LIFE' SENT EXPEDITION TO TUNDRA

To photograph the article on the tundra, the first such extensive journalistic coverage of the Canadian Arctic (pp.90-115), Life had to mount a self-sustaining expedition and send it in to a remote, uninhabited area for a long stay. In May of last year Photographer Fritz Goro and Reporter Jim Goode journeyed to Churchill, Manitoba, on the southern edge of the tundra, and assembled two tons of food and equipment. In three trips they flew themselves, the equipment, a guide and a radio

isolated Thelon Game Sanctuary, 200 miles north of the tree line and 450 miles northwest of Churchill, Landing on skis on rough lake ice on June 1, the party sent the plane back, set up a camp on frozen ground nearby.

It was still wintry. The land was snowdrifted, the lakes completely frozen. Cold and miserable, the party waited for spring, announced by the endless strings of migrating caribou. Spring thaw made photographic trips away 10 miles away took five days to reach.

For seven weeks the four men walked, stumbled, floated and slid over the mud-covered permafrost and ice-choked lakes and streams. Mosquitoes arrived in millions with summer. Food ran low. Shooting caribou was illegal and the oversize lake trout snapped the fishing lines. By the time Goro had photographed everything in sight and it was time to leave, the party was reduced to eating only macaroni.



THE ARMY ATMOSPHERE

The academic side of Staunton, as at other secondary military schools, is primarily preparation for college. Its class schedule covers most subjects a nonmilitary boys' school might offer since nine out of ten cadets go on to higher education. The best military schools have largely overcome the once widely held concept that military schools are the best place to knock decency into delinquents.

Staunton's atmosphere is nonetheless that of an army post. From the bugler's first call at 6:30 a.m. until 10 p.m. taps, the Staunton day is marked by a succession of formations, inspections and policing details. Each cadet drills daily with his government-issue M-1 rifle, from which the firing pin has been removed, and

two hours each week he studies military science. For any tiolation of the 40-page book of rules or any disobeyal of orders there is a penalty. Sample: four hours of walking special duty (left) for "failure to fill up pews in church after being told to do so."

The man who enforces Saunton's rules is Commandant Dound Stuton, a World War II sergean who believes "discipline is guidance," A headmaster, Colonel I. W. Pener, runs the academic program, and both Pence and Stuton report to the superintendent, Colonel Harrison Dept, Under them is a faculty of 30 who, except for two reitred regulars and four National Guard and Reserve officers, are all civilians—officers only in the Stutton army.



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VOICE FROM KOREA:

Medical writer recalls the plight of children in a nation which needs aid to rebuild itself

by DR. HOWARD A. RUSK

Distinguished Medical Journalist and President, American-Korean Foundation

THE GI was a Midwestern boy from Indiana. His job was driving a headquarters jeep. It was early on a March morning, 1933, and we were riding along the road outside Pusan. The air was frigid, and even in our heavy Army clothes we shivered. He was talking softly, mostly to himself, but I could listen—he wanted me to. He needed to talk, and he needed somebody to listen. "It wasn't so bad this winter," he said. "Last year I could hard-

"It wasn't so bad this winter," he said. "fast year I could hardly make myself drive my jeep to town in the morning. It was a srid., Twenty, 30, 40 people dead along the roadside, frozen stiff. The kids were the ones that got my goat. I wanted to cry and fight at the same time. This year it wasn't so bad—only three or four a morning, but I feel better now. Mostly I even feel good—I have ever since my outit adopted an orphanage."

You never leave Korea

THERE is an old saying that once you visit Korea, you can never leave. This is true. Your body can leave but you can't. You keep remembering the things you have seen there. You keep remembering the kids especially. You remember the children's hospitals. There never had been a children's hospital in Korea until the war. This is how the first one, in Pusan, got started.

A number of American troops had adopted orphans in 1951. They were sick, hungry, frightened kids until they were adopted, and then they weren't afraid or hungry anymore. But when the outfits had to move, the emotional impact was even worse. This was the problem that faced Major Cififord G. McKeon. It

This was the problem that faced Major Clifford G. McKeon. It was time for him to leave his orphan behind. He found that many of his friends were in the same predicament, so they all got together, chipped in and established an orphanage on a hill in Pusan. Its name: Hanny Mountain Orthanage.





children are given the first food, the first clothes and the warmest spot in the house.

The agony of remembering is softened a little by the recollection of visits to the orphanages. It is heart-warming to know that, out of the generosity of their hearts, our American troops have given more than 255 million from their own meager pay to Korea to save its children. They know what our government and the United Nations are doing for Korean relief, but they know it isn't enough. They gave money themselves because they wanted to. They are giving here in the US., 60. Veterans' organizations all over the country are putting on "marrhes" to solicit for the foundation (its address is simply c'o local postumester) is a non-profit, nonsectarian, nonpolitical organization, which has been aiding Korean reconstruction for 20 months.

In the havens these donations have already provided are happy children in swings, on teeter-toters and in sandboxes. They sing. They sing the plaintive Arizang which rings out wherever Koreans are at work and children are at play. No matter how long you have been away from Korea you remember hearing that same tune hummed by the Gls as they go about their task.

And then you remember something so small that it has almost slipped your memory, but it is something significant. It was March, but none of the children in these orphanages had runny noses. Each had a small homemade handkerchief pinned to his jacket: It was a little thing, but amid all these scenes of destitution, there is some solace in this little gesture by our GIs.

You remember the deep personal and spiritual resources of the Korean people: their remarkable mixture of stoic courage, dignity, adaptability and humor; their thirst for education; and their deep traditions of the family as the basic social unit. You chuckle again when you remember the time you said, "They tell me that you

Koreans are the Irish of the Orient," Looking you straight in the eve without the trace of a crinkle around the eves or mouth, the Korean answered, "No, doctor, whoever told you that was mis-taken. We are not the Irish of the Orient—the Irish are the Koreans of Europe.

Korea's spirit is still there, like a spark, flickering but alive. Korea needs more schools, hospitals, clinics and child welfare institutions. She desperately needs training for her people-more physicians, dentists, nurses, welfare workers, teachers, administrators, engineers, scientists and technicians. But even more than this. Korea needs to belong—to know that through courage, sacrifice and devotion to the principles of freedom, she has earned her place among the nations of the free world.

Education-\$4 a year

ESPITE inflation, a great deal can still be bought in Korea for a very little. An orphan can attend a public school for \$4 a year. One dollar a day will pay for a hospital bed in a children's hospital. Two hundred dollars a month of additional support for an orphan-age will provide an adequate supplementary diet, school equipment and a teacher.

Here in a country halfway around the world, where we fought a war we did not win, we have at long last a chance to win the peace. For the first time in history U.S. soldiers who have had to devas-

Our own government and the U.N. have programs of official aid, but that is not enough, materially or spiritually. The Koreans who have fought, suffered and died to be free must feel the compassion of the warm person-to-person friendship and admiration which they have earned. We can never repay the Koreans for their steadfastness and their suffering by material things alone. We can only repay them in the currency of friendship by helping them with their comeback.

We have paid in blood and lives to stop Communist aggression in Korea. In this fight for freedom, little Korea lost twice as many of its people as the U.S. lost in World War I, World War II and Korea combined. Yet, despite all their suffering, the Koreans remain unsubdued. When I visited hospitals, leprosariums, refugee amps and hospitals on two missions to Korea last year (see below), never heard a child ery or a man groan in his pain. All that was ked can be summed up in the appeal of one who said to me, Won't you help us off our knees so we can continue to fight for the free world?

Through military measures, Communist aggression has been halted in Korea, but the same vigor and determination that marked ur military efforts must now be devoted to the economic and social reconstruction of this war-devastated nation. Otherwise we nay lose through the "back door" what we have gained at a tremendous expenditure of lives and money.

It is when you remember all of these things that you are glad ou can never really leave Korea, that you are privileged to earry part of it with you always in your heart. It is a privilege as well o be part of a crusade that helps a gallant nation off its knees.



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
