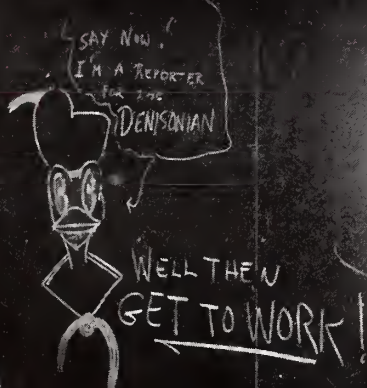

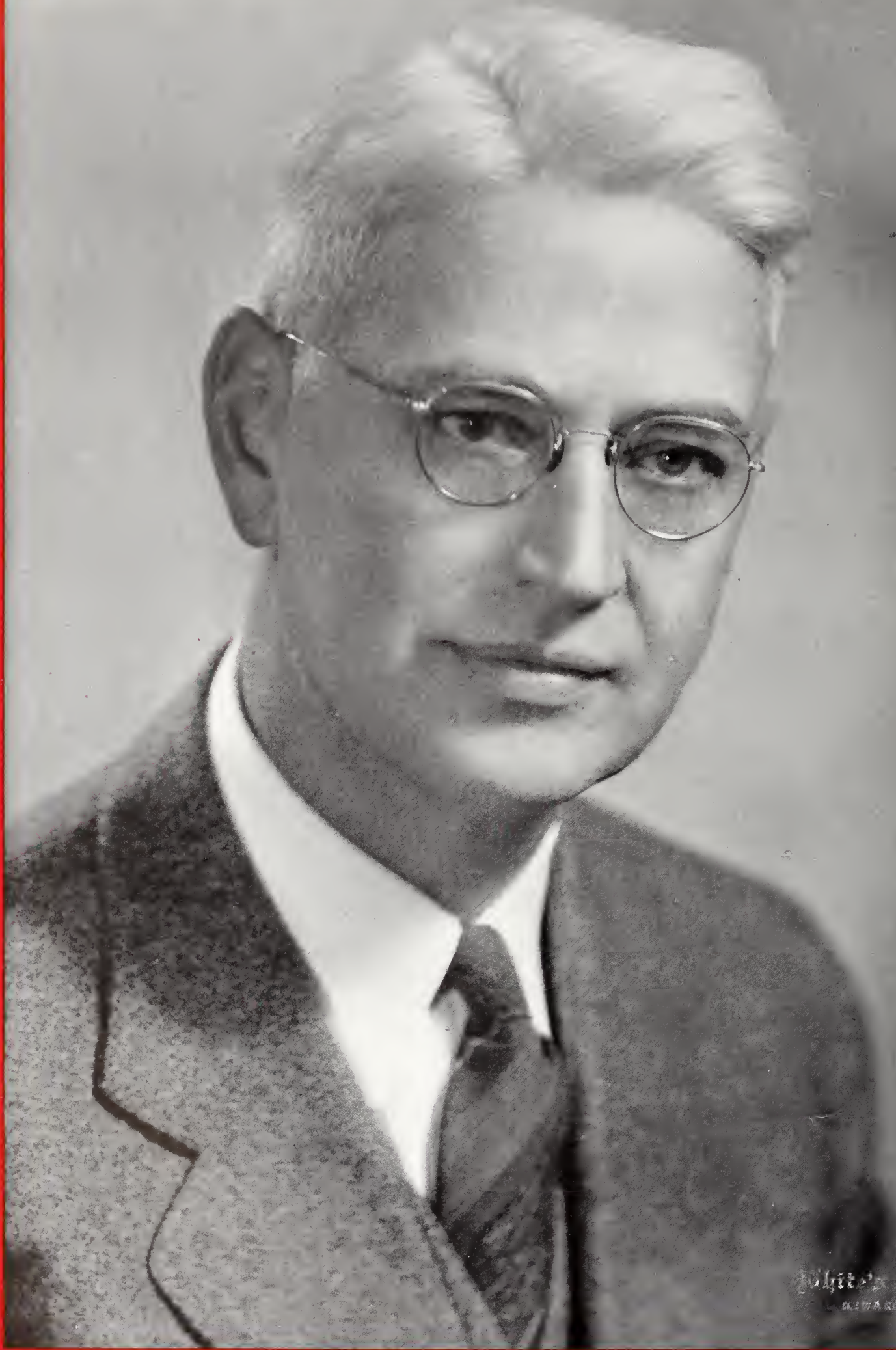

# DOCTOR BROWN

The Harvard report on general education emphasizes and re-emphasizes the necessity of an institution agreeing on its objectives. Denison has its ten objectives which are known to all of you. At the same time, I have been wondering how those objectives could be summed up in a single objective. I wonder if we would agree on this:—that we have ambitions to see Denison University become the finest, small Christian college of liberal arts and sciences in the Middle West. Each word in that sentence has significance for every policy of the University. If the aim were to be achieved, it would mean a carefully selected body of students, widely distributed geographically, with ambitions to profit by the kind of program which Denison offers. 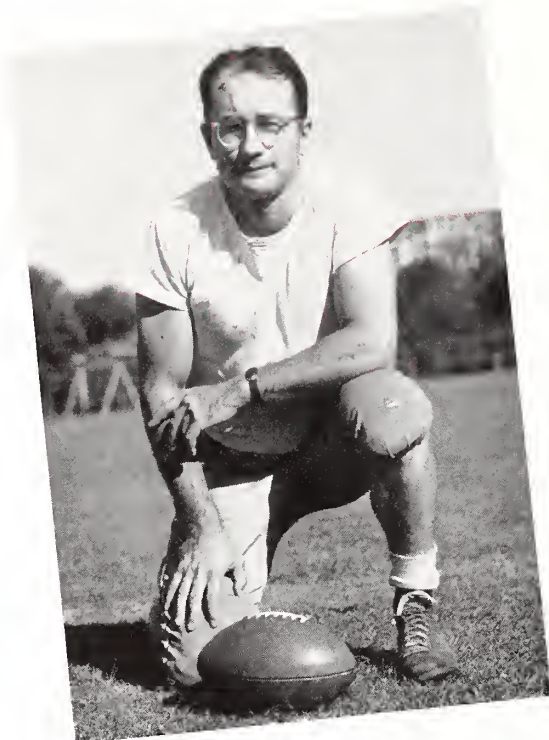


# FOOTBALL

All in all it was a mass effect to give to the world the bigger — the better 1946 Adytum.

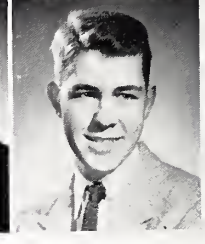
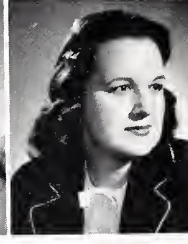
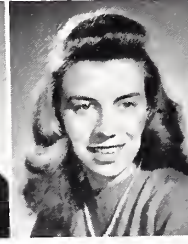
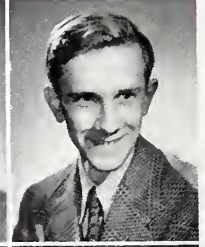
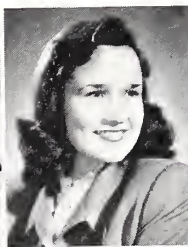
