## WE GUARANTEE

All goods contained in this Catalogue to be strictly as represented, and if any article should not prove satisfactory to the Lodge, it may be exchanged within ten days after arrival, provided the article has not been used and is not soiled or damaged. (This does not apply to Seals, Lanterns, Badges or any article having the name and number of the Lodge thereon, if made as ordered, nor to goods made specially to order. When it becomes necessary to exchange an article, the Lodge must always prepay the express charges on the goods returned.

## All articles in this Catalogue are subject to a discount for CASH.

## SHIPPING.

## ALL GOODS ARE SHIPPED BY EXPRESS UNLESS OTHERWISE ORDERED.

When ordered shipped by FREIGHT, the Lodge or party ordering must assume all risk of delays, damage and loss.

## ORDERING.

Remember that miny of the articles catalogued are made to order only, and therefore sufficient time should be allowed for filling an order. It is difficult to state exactly "how long," as that will depend altogether on the quantity and class of goods wanted. Ordinarily from ten to twenty days is ampie time to fill an order.

When goods are wanted for a particular date, always mention the fact in your orders and we will promptly notify you whether or not we can fill the order by the time specified.

Give the number of this Catalogue (No. 10), the list number and the list price, of each article you order.

Always attach the Seal of the Lodge to the order, if you do not want the goods sent C. O. D.

When the Seal of the Lodge is not attached to the order, the goods will be sent by Express C. O. D. with privilege of examination before paying, in accordance with the rules of the Express Co.

Goods can be s int by freight C. O. D. (Bill of Lading attached to Sight Draft) but the goods cannot be examined before being paid for. This is the rule of the Railroad Companies and they will not waive it. Our standing, however, is sufficient guarantee that we will correct, free of expense to the Lodge, any errors of ours, if such be found.

All orders for secret paraphernalia are filled in accordance with the Law of the Supreme Lodge, only.

NOTE,-Our Monitors' Room is so constructed that when not in use it can be folded together and set in a space 6 feet 8 inches high, 26 inches wide, and 10 inches deep. It can be setup in three or four minutes, and again, as quickly taken down and removed from the Lodge room.

When set up the interior is in absolute darkness-no matter how brightly the Lodge room is lit up. It is the most perfect article of the kind in the market.

White Robe. Blue cloak; yellow lining.
White lobe. Purple cloak; yellow lining.
Yellow Robe. Scarlet cloak: white lining.
Pale Blue Robe. Crimson cloak; yellow lining.
Lilac Robe. Pink cloak; white lining.
Scarlet Robe. Yellow cloak; white lining.
In contrasting colors, always use colors that will blend well together. Nature never makes a mistake in coloring, men often do.

This costume can be duplicated in cheaper goods; but not as a work of art, as it appears and as we produce it.

Where the general style is desired in fine cashmeres, or in satins, omitting the more expensive details, we will submit special bids, provided the request is made under the seal of the Lodge. The cloak is, necessarily, a part of the costume; as, without it, the costume would be shorn of much of its beauty.

We avoid over-deroration on this costume everywhere, but give beauty and simplicity thrir full effectiveness.

Any Lodge that equips ten senators with these costumes would be equipped equal to anything upon the stage for classic robes.

## FUNERAL ROSETTES AND BADGES.

Lodges and individual Knights of Pythias are forbidden, by the Supreme Lodge law, to use any insignia of mourning other than the regulation funeral rosette, which can only be secured from the Supreme Keeper of Records and Seal, R. L. C. White, Nashville, Tenn.

This law abrogates and annuls all funeral badges, either single or reversible, except those supplied by the Supreme Lodge, and we can not quote or sell any funeral badges, single or double.

Parade badges are permissable, and we quote them for parade purposes only, but they can not be worn at funerals.

# SENATORIAL WORK. 

OR LONG FORM, THIRD RANK.

## Letter of Information :

(This letter takes the blace of a written one, is easier read, and conveys specific information.)

In the Senatorial work, it is presumed that the Lodge ordering, has the necessary costumes for its regular officers, as tabulated in the preceding supplements to outfits for new K. P. Lodges, specified in the preceding pages.

We therefore omit the costumes for officers, as they can be selected from the catalogue, pages 42 to 49 , or from the supplements without duplicating here.

In making your selections, remember our tabulated outfits are not arbitrary, but can be used as a guide to make any desired selection you may prefer.

## A FEW WORDS ON COSTUMES FOR SENATORS

Some Lodges prefer the Roman Costumes, Togas and Tunics. These will be tound commencing on page 54 , see plates $13,14,15,16$ and 17.

Other Lodges prefer the Grecian Costumes, Robes with bright colored borders, etc. These we illustrate in plates $18,19,20,21,22,23,24$ and 25 on pages 56 to 60 , and an especially fine one on the back cover-page of this catalogue, and which is described on pages 60 and 61 .

We also provide Cloaks to go with the Grecian Robes, see page 61. It is not intended, however that all of the Senators should wear cloaks, but rather, that not to exceed half may, in order to give greater individuality to each.

We do not make the entire set alike, as it is not presumed that Senators were clothed like a military company, all uniform.

A special note, or letter appears on page 52 which we particularly call your attention to, as nur aim in our notes, is to give the fullest information to the reader.

## SCRIBE'S COSTUME.

On page 66 we say " The Scribe usually wears a white wig and beard" we change this here and use a head-dress as being more appropriate, and also because Pythagoras wears a wig and beard and they would appear too much alike.

## HEADSMAN AND ATTENDANTS

There are two styles of Costumes for the Headsman. The Robe as described on page 66 , and Tunics as shown in plates 32,33 and 34 on pages 72 and 73 . The Lodge or committee, can best judge which they prefer. The Headsman should be equipped with a Headsman's axe, see pages 37 and 38 .

The Attendants in a cheaper outfit can be costumed with Robes and Headdresses. Never use a Helmet with a Robe. It is incongruous.

Select Robes from "Officers Robes," commencing on page 42, and Head-dresses to correspond commencing on page 67 . In a better outfit the Attendants should be costumed as Warriors, with spears and shields, or with swords and belts as preferred.

They should be equipped as follows:
With Armor Coats, see page 71 .
With Leggings, see page 79 .
With Helmets, see page 23.
With Spears or Halberds, see page 34.
With Shields, see pages 27 and 28.
Or, if preferred, omit the Leggings and use long stockings and sandals, see pages 35 and 36. Again, if preferred, omit the Swords and Belts, and use Axes. See pages 37 and 38 .

## KING'S GUARDS OR SPEARMEN.

An escort of Spearmen, is ritualistic, and hence permissable, and adds to the beauty of dramatized work. A detachment of $4,6,8,10$ or even more can be used, always having even numbers, with a Captain of the Guards, if wanted. This officer should have a rather finer armor costume, and be equipped with sword and belt, instead of a spear.

The Spearmen or Guards to King should be equipped as follows:
With Tunics or Armor Coats, see page 71.
With Helmets, see page 23.
With Leggings, see page 79 .
With Spears or Halberds, see page 34.
Or, the Leggings can be omitted, and long stockings and sandals used instead, see pages 35 and 36 .
